butter, brine 25 to 30 per roll, store 15 to
20 cts. per roll, choice dairy 30 to 25 cts.
per roll, creamery 35 to 40 cts. per roll;
flour \$2.40 to \$2.50 per barrel. Wool
buyers are waiting on the tariff.
