A CHALLENGE.

Mr. Handley, editor of the Advocate, is a fluent talker and a ready writer, and will be able, no doubt, to handle any political question as well or better than anyone in his clique, therefore he can perhaps interest the public. And, we understand by his speeches, and other utterances that he is opposed to any legislation in the direction of free silver. Therefore, the editor of this paper challenges Mr. Handley to discuss this question through the papers published here. Mr. Mr. Handley can have the question for debate stated in almost any form he pleases, though we suggest it be something like the following:

"Resolved, That the present money system favors the rich and oppresses the poor, and is the principal cause of the prevalent financial distress and suffering among the industrial classes."

If Mr. Handley sees fit to accept this challenge, we will arrange to publish all or part of his arguments in the lead of our comment, providing he will show the same courtesy in return, thereby giving everyone an opportunity to read both sides of the question, and make it impossible for either argument to garble statements or dodge salient points at issue. Now, if Mr. Handley wishes his arguments read by all the people, he should take advantage of the large circulation of the HEADLIGHT and explain to the people how he feels on the financial question.

THE NATIONAL SALUTES.

The national salutes for both the Army and Navy of the United States is twenty-one guns. A salute to the Union, commemorative of the Declaration of Independence, consisting of one gun for each State, is fired at noon on July 4th at every post provided with artillery. The president, both on his arrival and departure from a military post, or when passing its vicinity, receives a salute of twenty-one guns. No other salute is fired in his presence. The Vice-President and President of the Senate

receives a salute of nineteen guns; members of the cabinet, the Chief Justice, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, a committee of Congress officially visiting a military post, and governors, within their respective States and Territories, receive seventeen guns. The Assistant Secretary of War receives fifteen guns.—August Ladies' Home Journal.

GOOD OMENS.

Several Republican State conventions in the east have recently adopted platforms quite favorable to silver, and in Iowa, the following is a part of the platform:

"We favor the largest possible use of silver as a money that is consistent with the permanent maintenance of the equal values of all dollars in circulation."

Some people have an idea that people who advocate free silver think that it should be made so free that every man can go up to the treasury box and grab all he wants of it.

An effort will be made to get the business men of Astoria interested in extending the Tillamook & Bay City telegraph line to Astoria. There would be only about thirty miles of line to be built, as it already extends to Nehalem, and there is a cable from Astoria across Young's bay to Point Adams. There are many reasons why this would be the best line for Astoria and Tillamook. Connection could be made with the Western Union at Forest Grove as it is now, or the line could be extended from Forest Grove to Portland at small expense and connect with the Postal Telegraph Company's lines there. The people of Astoria do a good business over the wire up the Columbia to Portland, but it is down a great deal of the time, causing great inconvenience and loss at time. Whenever the Columbia is high, operations on the line cease, and a great deal of the time during the winter the line is not in running order. The worst of it is, there is a great expense in keeping that line up, as it runs along over marshy islands, lakes, swamps, sloughs, rocky bluffs, and across rugged canyons. Besides, there is no wagon road along the route, no trail, and little prospect of a railroad on that route soon. The line-men go out in boats to make repairs, and often they have to wind around through the tortuous sloughs, going five miles to get one mile, and hunting all night for a break. The dead timber, which is always falling, and the high water, makes it a bad line even with a railroad along the route. The Tillamook line, running from Forest Grove to Nehalem, via Tillamook, a distance of about 40 miles, follows a wagon road all the way, and it is a good road, for a mountain road, being open the year round. As there is a wagon road now from Nehalem to Seaside, there would be no difficulty in keeping that part of the line in repair. Two men, some of the ranchers living on the line, one between Nehalem and Seaside could easily keep the line in repair at all times, and only devote a small part of their time to it, except for a few days in the winter, as has been conclusively shown between here and Forest Grove. There are several offices along this line, Gales Creek, Glenora, Besters, Tillamook City, Bay City, Hobsonville, Nehalem, and Nehalem City, which with Seaside and Skipanon, would much more than pay the expense of keeping the line up. In fact

if it were kept in good order Tillamook City or Seaside either, ought to afford enough revenue to pay expenses. The summer visitors here and at Seaside would use the line a great deal. Astorians who have interests in Tillamook would be greatly benefited, and the shipping interests between the two places would be greatly facilitated. Astoria would get much trade that now goes to Portland, if this line were built, and the Tillamook trade is worth striving for now. It is to be hoped the Chamber of Commerce of Astoria will interest itself in this matter, and investigate its merits thoroughly. The people of this county have contributed to build the line we now have, and as it would cost not more than \$1000 to extend it from Nehalem to Astoria, the project ought to be carried out. Astorians should be able to raise that amount for this purpose in about 15 minutes, and will if they understand the benefits they will receive. With this proposed connection neither Astoria nor Tillamook need ever be shut off from telegraphic connection with the outside world.
