The way the mail schedule is arranged, the North Yamhill hotels do not derive much benefit from the Tillamook stage travel. The stop-overs are made either at the Mountain House on the other side, or at Crowson's on this side. It is a little hard on North Yamhill.

A good many people are advocating free roads from here to Willamette valley. It is claimed the summer travel would be doubled if the roads were made free. We have interviewed some parties regarding this matter, and will give the subject full attention next week.

In reference to the HEADLIGHT's remarks regarding the mail schedule, the North Yamhill Record says:

The above is very strange, to say the least. We are informed that the present schedule was arranged at the request of the people of Tillamook. These business men can now, under the present arrangement, get their mail that arrives in North Yamhill Saturdays 26 hours sooner than they did under the old schedule, and yet not satisfied! If the mail should leave here Sunday, and arrive there Monday, they would only get the same mail that they now get on Sunday, and—or 26 hours earlier—as there are no Sunday trains on the railroad. What do the Tillamookers want, a seven days service, or special carriers to deliver their mail to them while out fishing on Sunday?—North Yamhill Record.
