Mr. John Malaney was the first white settler on the lower "Big Nestucca." Himself and three stalwart sons cleared a home on the rich bottom land of the isolated section, in 1873—nearly 21 years ago, and he and his sons, Albert and John, still own the old homestead. Old "Slimlegs" a Tillamook chief and a few salmon eaters acted pretty ugly for a time and threatened to kill the pioneers but there were four trusty rifles always ready and the Indians finally gave up their schemes of killing the whites. On one occasion a whale came ashore on the beach opposite to the Malaney cabin and the boys undertook the task of saving some of the oil. The Indians came over and haughtily informed the whites that everything that came ashore belonged to them. This the boys denied. They claimed the whale, and for a time matters looked squally, but finding that the job of oil saving would not be profitable the boys relinquished their right to the whale for a boat load of salmon, and the Indians reveled in whale flesh and blubber for several days. Another time the Indians pulled up some apple trees Mr. Malaney had set out and were warned not to repeat the outrage or they would get some hot lead from the Henry rifles of the intrepid settlers. They were not further molested.

Lindsay DeLashmott and Dr. Tatom returned from Tillamook Monday. Lindsay drove his team from Tillamook City that day to Sheridan in 11 hours, a distance of about 65 miles.

At Middleton, Yamhill county, there is a pickle and sauerkraut factory. The stockholders are the neighboring farmers, who raise cucumbers and cabbage for the business. The stock subscribed was \$5,000 and half of that

went for engines and fixtures. The main building is 66x50, besides the engine room and cooper shop. There are 40 acres in cucumbers. Picking has just commenced, and furnishes employment to the young people of the neighborhood. The barrels and kegs are made in the cooper shop and the timber cut in the immediate neighborhood. It is quite a flourishing home industry.
