##### The Demand for Trained Teachers Rapidly Increasing.

The demand for teachers with Normal training is growing rapidly in the state.

The State Normal School at Monmouth reports that out of the 46 members of the graduating class of 1893 all but one were employed as teachers during the past year. Of its 217 graduates, exclusive of this year's class of 51 members, 164 are reported as at present engaged in teaching. The first class was graduated eleven years ago.

The demand for teachers with training and experience is far beyond the supply; the supply of untrained and inexperienced teachers, on the other hand, is far beyond the demand.

Both for the good of the teaching and the good of the schools, a thorough Normal course should be taken by those who expect to seek positions in the public schools of the state. It pays to prepare top compete for the best places.

The Tillamook Lumbering Company has just received a large fire proof, burglar proof safe. It weighs 3500 pounds, and will be a great convenience to Treasures John Barker.

The following teachers were selected at the last meeting of the school board, with the salaries per month indicated: W. R. Robb, principal, of Portland, \$70. Albert Mason, grammar department, \$40. Mrs. F. R. Beals, primary department, \$40. The school will commence next Monday, and will continue three months.

This combination is highly spoken of, and will give entertainment worth hearing. The members of this company are members of the Forest Grove band, and they are now rusticated at Netarts. They have issued large posters, which gives the various features of their show. They will give a free out-door performance at 7:30 in the evening, before the show begins.

Correspondents to county papers, or to other papers, should remember that it is not in good taste, and is, in fact, in very bad taste, for one person to send news items to both county papers at the same time. Such persons do not command the respect of either newspaper. We have discontinued using items from two or three correspondents on account of this very thing. Tuttle & Cary have erected a tower, placing thereon a windmill and a 100-barrel tank. The windmill has a twelve-foot wheel and is automatic in its action. The water is pumped up from a well which they dug under the tower, and the tank being over 30 feet above the ground, there is sufficient pressure to throw water 30 feet in height. A two-inch pipe runs from the tank to the front of their store building, and this will afford protection against fire for a considerable distance around their store. Messrs. Tuttle & Cary

have erected this institution for fire protection, and to demonstrate the use of windmills in this country. It is to be hoped that others will follow their example and put up windmills and reservoirs. The city council should put such an outfit on the firebell tower. A few such reservoirs in the town, with a few hundred feet of hose would afford better means of fighting fire, perhaps, than a fully equipped fire engine, and Tuttle & Cary sell these things very cheap now. They are making other improvements about their premises, and will soon have one of the most complete hardware establishments in Western Oregon.

Katie Kehm Smith, Secretary of the Oregon State Secular Union and lecturer of the First Secular Church of Portland, assisted by Nettie A. Olds, Sup't Portland Secular Sunday School and 4th V.
