THE QUESTION OF THE CHAPERON.

A word about chaperons, writes Mrs. Burton Kingsland in the fourth paper in the series "A Daughter at Sixteen" in the September Ladies Home Journal. The conventionalities differ in different parts of our country, but in New York the custom of chaperonage obtains, and the fashion is set by

those acknowledged to be well versed in the requirements of polite society. It is not that boys and girls may not be trusted in each others company. A chaperon merely represents the sheltering love and care that is supposed to surround a young girl's life. In one sense it is but a conventional-ity. A gentleman gives his arm to a lady to cross a ballroom, not because she needs his protection, but the act is representative of the considered due her womanhood. On the other hand, it does impose a slight restraint upon youthful spirits that sometimes threaten to exceed the bounds of good taste. A chaperon should be regarded as the guest of honor, and American youth are none the worse for opportunities to learn to treat their elders with courtesy and consideration.

THE BIG CHURCH.

The object of the Oregon State Secular Association are as follows:

First—The repeal of all laws that exempt church property from taxation; that force the observance of Sunday as the Sabbath; that appropriate public funds for sectarian institutions; that tolerate any religious exercises, readings, display or prayer in any public school, body or institution maintained wholly or in part at public expense; and generally accomplish the total separation of Church and State and effect the complete secularization of government—local, state and national.

Second—To charter, organize and assist auxiliary Secular Unions and Secular Science Schools throughout the state and appoint and commission lecturers.

Third—To prescribe, adopt, publish, sell and distribute books, pamphlets, leaflets and papers advocating its objects and principles.

Fourth—To protect by every lawful means any member whose equal religions or civil rights are infringed.

Fifth—Generally, to do and encourage every act, proceeding and thing necessary to the attainment of its object.
