The regular traffic from Forest Grove and Hillsboro to Portland would pay a great part of the running expenses, and the logging business on this end would be a great help. This is the road that Tillamook needs above all others.

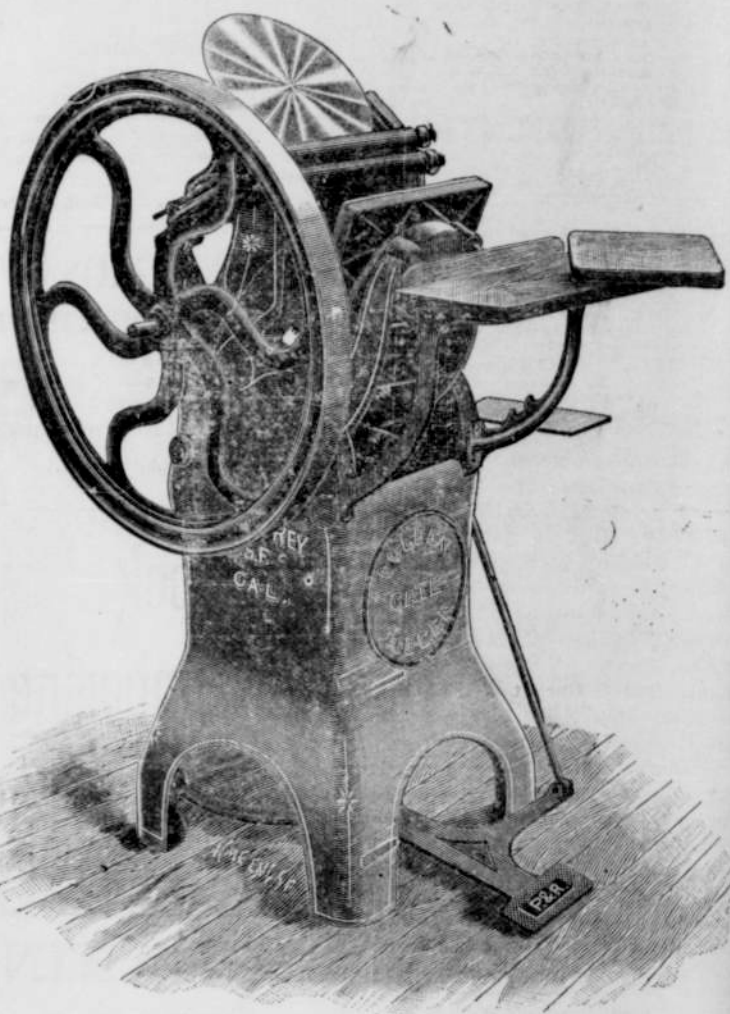
Ironing & Washing.
