When Morrison returned Cristofson was missing. Acting upon the theory that the man accidentally fell into the water the neighbors have dragged the river and used dynamite to cause the body to arise if it be in the river, but without avail. Mrs. Cristofson has returned to her brother in Astoria. It is a strange case, and there are some persons who believe that Cristofson made up his mind to take French leave, and carried out his plan. He was in very poor circumstances.
