## WARNING

Some swindlers in Portland are still seiling lots in Tillamook Park "addition," and occasionally a deed comes to the county clerk's office to be recorded. The lots are not worth enough to pay for recording the deed, in fact the whole "addition" isn't worth ten cents. The latest victims are Fred A. Ruth. ledge, and three hrothers, whoe exchanged some Portland property for several lots in the paper townsite. The name signeat to the deed is "Geo. M. Johnson" of Portland, and the deed is acknowledged be fore Notary Public Petran.
The lotsreferred to are on a rug. ged, harren motntain side, mu wagon road in twenty miles, no trail any where near, and tho owner never saw the property, and mo surveyor has ever been on it. It consists of 40 acres of absolutely worthless sehool land, and it is about as near Portland as Tillamook. It is doubtful if it is in this county, as there is some question as to the exact location of the line. It isn't fit for a goat pasture, and the unfortunate suckers who bought lots there will never see them. The authorities of Portland should arrest this "Geo. M. Johmson" next time he appears before Petrain to acknowledge a deed, and Rutledge Bros, should at once prosecute the rogue and breng suit for the recovery of their property. Those who bought fots are foolish to pay taxem on them. This has been exposed before, and it is about time people quit biting at this swindle.
