

DRY STOCKING.

It Needs a Stronger Current to Deepen It.

At present a great deal of the time there are several inches of loose gravel and sand on the bottom of Dry Stocking bar, and logs, roots and debris settle there where the channel ought to be, making navigation very difficult at low stages of water.

Mr. Chas. Hemstreet, of the steamer Louise, who has made a careful study of the situation says that a stronger current is what is most needed. The old channel of Trask which empties into Hoquarton just above the government jetties, is full of wrack heaps, and is almost filled up with debris. This causes nearly all the water to take the new channel into Tillamook river, and no advantage is derived from the current of the mighty Trask river.

Dougherty slough which branches off from Wilson river and empties into Hoquarton is also badly jammed with logs and wrack, and little advantage is obtained from the current from this source any more.

Mr. Hemstreet thinks that unless something is done soon there will be no channel at all at Dry Stocking, and that Tillamook will have to do her shipping some other way.

Of course a wharf can be built west to Tillamook river, which would bring the city within a reasonable distance of good water, about one mile, but the old Hoquarton slough should not be allowed to fill up.

Mr. Hemstreet says the old Trask channel should be opened by cutting out the logs, and that the new channel, the one which empties into Tillamook river, should be closed. He thinks this would speedily remedy matters, and could be done at little expense.

At the same time the Wilson river should be turned into Hoquarton and this can be done with little expense. We believe this would prevent the deposit of sand and silt at Junction bar, improving the channel there, and soon cut a twelve-foot channel through Dry Stocking.

Since writing the above we have learned that Mr. D. B. Ogden, the engineer in charge of the government improvements here, has been looking over the ground between Hoquarton and Wilson river with a view to cutting a channel that will connect them and bring the vast volume of Wilson rivers waters through Hoquarton via Tillamook city. We learn that the authorities are are impressed with the fact that something of the kind should be done, and will make a survey of the ground and take the necessary preliminary steps towards the desired end.

Cooled his Ardent.

A young fellow who is not very bright filled up on "epopeen-ju" the other night and was singing ribald songs in a way that attracted too much attention.

The city marshal, Denis Ryan, gathered him by the seat of his pantaloons and gently wafted him to the city refrigerator, where he was allowed to cool off over night. Lumber Trade.

W. A. Donaldson, one of the principal stock holders, and general manager of the Truckee Lumber Company, which has mills at Truckee, California and at Hobsonville in this county, came up on the last trip of the steamer Truckee and will stop over one trip.

The company has a large mill in San Francisco where it manufactures boxes on a large scale of the lumber from its Tillamook and Truckee mills.

Mr. Donaldson says the lumber market is very dull now, and that the sale of boxes is very slow owing to the hard times.

The company furnishes nearly all of the enormous supply of boxes used in the Santa Clara valley, and in the Los Angeles country, besides shipping to various localities in the interior and on the Mexican coast.

Mr. Donaldson is a clear-headed, conservative business man, and he says that he does not look for any great revival in the lumber trade or any other branch of business on this coast until some favorable legislation is made regarding silver, though he thinks the opening of the Nicaragua canal would work wonders. He thinks the San Joaquin Valley railroad will be built speedily, and that that competing line to Frisco will help matters on this coast considerable.
