MR. CHAMBERLAIN AGAIN.

ED. HEADLIGHT:—As regards my "Coupling free silver and free trade" in another communication, it looks too much like a bawky mule and a wild steer for a family tema.

I regard them as neither of them conducive to the interest of the American people in our present relations with other nations. I only mention them as free trade as having been adopted, as nearly as the present administration could establish it, after promising in its platform for 1892, the result of which is too plainly felt by the poor of our country diminished wages. The promise of which (that is free trade) may well be compared to cutting the roots of the tree of our national fruitage and prosperity, the leaves immediately began to wither, and when the election was announced the fruit began to fall off until even the Coxeyites had difficulty in filling their empty baskets.

While capital with its commendable caution hid itself away in bank vaults or climbed to some secure place while the procession is passing and free silver the advocacy of which without mention of restrictions we common people understand as free coinage, and I believe the fear that exists in the minds of men of sufficient financial ability to have gold in their possession will keep it where the present ignorance of political ceremony now prevailing among us shall exist. You speak of the necessity of electing representatives that are favorable to silver and show Germany and England that we are willing, please allow me to ask, how favorable to silver?

The impression that I get from reading "foreign times" is that England, Germany and France all believe that there must be a standard and that represented by the unit or one like a thing or family with a head or one to decide the comparative value of others I think by the spirit manifested by those who are responsible for their own and the financial success of the various nations that they think that one head is enough for a financial system as it is for the body or mind of anything else. They may be induced sometime to agree to an international standard of free coinage for a while but it is doubted by some how long so great confidence and familiarity would continue.

It would be an experiment much desired by some and has some show of benefit but I much doubt whether in view of the Rothschilds opening the vast gold mines of Africa whether England will enter such an agreement.

I am pleased to agree with you so far as possible and endorse ideas expressed in the Chicago paper, but when I find that it and the HEADLIGHT's claiming that a single handed attempt to rehabili-

itate silver by this country certainly could not make matters worse than they are.

And see a party of congressmen forming and casting their net for populists, democrats, silverites and the disaffected of all parties who appears to be increasing in the hard times. I can without a pessimistic view see breakers ahead.

THE SILVER PROBLEM.

New York Morning Advertiser: It is a serious mistake to attempt to belittle or underestimate the free silver movement in the West. The efforts which are being put forth to organize a distinct silver party are, of course, a fair subject for ridicule. Such efforts, judging from present indications are bound to end in failure. They are certain to end in failure, however, for the very reason that the movement in favor of free silver coinage is a matter of grave importance. The silver sentiment is so strong in many sections of the West that it threatens to dominate at least one of the existing political parties.

It is equally an error to denounce the advocates and supporters of free silver coinage as demagogues and cranks. A few of the leaders may deserve such stigmas but the great majority of their followers do not. The latter as a rule are not only intelligent and patriotic citizens, but they are intensely in earnest. It is the very sincerity, indeed, of the vast mass of believers in silver coinage which renders the movement in behalf of it formidable. These voters are thoroughly convinced that the recent fall in the price of agricultural and other products is due to the demonetization of the white metal, and neither vilification nor misrepresentation can remove this conviction. It is the part of sensible men to recognize these facts and to deal with them in a practical way.

Nothing appears more positive at present than the silver question is certain to play an important part in the next national campaign. The sections in which the demand for free silver coinage is strong are plainly determined to push that issue to the front, and political leaders should be prepared to meet it. So far as the Republican party is concerned it seems as if an adjustment might be reached which, while giving the white metal wider recognition, would not menace the integrity of our currency system. Many Republican leaders maintain that such a solution of the silver problem is practicable, and Republican statesmanship, which has successfully coped so many questions equally intricate, should prove capable of settling this one.

CULLOM FOR Bimetallism.

Chicago Evening Mail: "Mr. Cleveland's letter to the Chicago business men is not what I expected him to write," said Senator Shelby M. Cullom this morning. The Senator is in town on a business trip and was seen at the Auditorium.

"The sentiment he expresses," continued Mr. Cullom, "are sound enough but he follows his usual practice of using generalities. Whether he is in favor of a single gold standard exclusively I am not able to say. You know as much about him as I do."

"I had a talk with the President recently," continued the Senator, "and he told me he would appoint delegates to a new monetary conference whenever the European governments officials united in calling a conference and appointed delegates. It is true the Senate and House of Representatives have already appointed delegates to the proposed conference, but the President is not compelled by any law to do so."

"So far as the Republican party is concerned, it is now and always has been in favor of a sound currency. It is in favor of genuine bimetallism. It is in favor of gold dollars, and it is in favor of silver

dollars, but it insists that one dollar shall be as good as another, anywhere and everywhere. The Republican party is against gold monometallism, and it is against silver monometallism. I believe it is possible to fix a bimetallic standard by international agreement, and I hope the day is not far distant when this will be accomplished and the money question settled.

"Concerning the coming silver convention of our Democratic brethren," continued the Senator, with a broad smile, "we must not interfere with that racket. Senator John M. Palmer told me quite recently that he believed the sound money men of the Democratic party would be strong enough to control the convention and thwart the schemes of the extreme silver men to commit the party to free coinage in advance of the action of the regular covention. I have reason to believe that Senator Palmer relies largely upon the Democracy of Chicago to come to the rescue. But let 'em fight."

A FLOATING CANNERY.

An American schooner has recently been fitted at New York with every facility for cooking and canning fish, game, fruits, etc., for the purpose of cruising in southern waters and collecting these delicacies and canning them at sea. This novel enterprise is expected to yield encouraging profits, since many of the goods canned in this way may be brought into the country free of duty. The ship is provided with an eight horse power boiler and three 25 gallon copper caldrons. The boiler was set up in the middle of the deck and connected by pipes with a large circular cast iron "process kettle." The schooner carries six canners and a chief in addition to the regular crew. Some 150,000 empty cans have been shipped, all of which it is expected will be filled during the voyage.

The materials to be canned will be turtle, pompano, guava jelly and fish, game and fruit of many kinds. The turtles will be caught in the West Indies and off the Florida coast. Much of the material will be secured by exchanging for them various manufactured articles, with which the ship is well supplied. When the actual work begins, the meats will first be boiled down in the three copper caldrons. Next they will be canned and lowered into the process kettle in steel crates and boiled at a high temperature under steam pressure in order to make them keep. The preparation of the meats, fish, jellies, etc., will be superintended by the chief in charge and cooked after the most approved receipt. The floating cannery is expected to return to New York some time in the fall. Part of the canned goods will be brought back on the schooner and part will be landed at southern ports and sent by steamship or railroad to the North.—Scientific American.

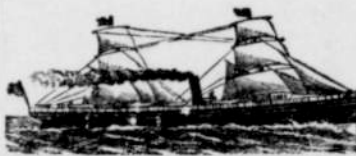
