The statement of milk furnished by Goodspeed and Haskins is made by taking the same amount of milk that C. R. Hunt furnished at the Tillamook factory as a basis, and showing actual test and price received by Goodspeed and Haskins at Fairview creamery.

This is made without considering the matter of skim milk or whey.

MARKETS.

Dated Portland, May 2, 1895.

Wheat—Eastern markets have gained during the past week about four cents per bushel. The English market has not gained in proportion. The advance is checked here by the scarcity of vessels and higher freight rates.

Oats—The receipts are light. Choice grades find ready sale at 28 to 30 cents. Inferior qualities are selling at 25c to 26c per bushel. The California markets are steady and firm.

Barley—The market continues dull at \$11.51 to \$12.00 per ton for good feed.

Eggs—Receipts are very large and selling today at 8 to 8½ cents.

Potatoes—There is no export demand at present. Choice burbanks selling at 25 to 30 cents; inferior, 15 to 20 cents per sack.

Hay—Choice timothy, \$9.00 to \$9.50 per ton; other kinds in large supply and not wanted.

Butter—The receipts are greater than the demand. Sales are slow at very low prices. Brine, 15 @ 20 cents per roll for No. 1; store, in rolls, 12½ @ 15 cents per roll; choice dairy, 20 @ 25 cents per roll; creamery, 30 @ 35 cents per roll.

Flour—The market is firm with a tendency to increase values in sympathy with wheat, selling at \$2.00 to \$2.30 per barrel.

Coal Oil—Declined on the 26th to 23 cents in tins.

Coffee—All markets are firm and held at higher rates. No change in package coffees.

Sugars—Advanced ½ cent to special points yesterday. No change locally.

Smoked meats and lard—Are in large supply with only a small demand. City packed is jobbing at 11½ to 12 cents for hams; sides 9 to 9½ cents; shoulders, 6½ to 6 cents; pure lard, 9½ to 10 cents. Country cured there is very little demand for at low prices.

Chickens—Old, \$3.00 @ \$3.50; broilers \$2.50 @ \$4.00.

Onions—\$1.00 per sack for choice.

Horticultural Quarantine Regulations.

At a special meeting of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture, held in Portland, April 2, 1895, all members present, the following regulations were adopted, in accordance with the laws regulating such matters, and are, therefore, binding upon all persons. The regulations are to take effect and be in force from and after May 4, 1895:

RULE 1.—All consignees, agents or other persons, shall, within 24 hours, notify the quarantine officer of the State Board of Horticulture, or a duly commissioned quarantine guardian, of the arrival of any trees, plants, buds or cions at the quarantine station, in the district of final destination.

RULE 2.—All trees, plants, cuttings, grafts, buds or cions, imported or brought into the state from any foreign country, or from any of the United States or territories are hereby required to be inspected upon arrival at the quarantine station in the district of final destination, and if any such nursery stock, trees, plants, cuttings, grafts, buds or cions are found to be free of insect pests and fungous diseases, the said quarantine officer or duly commissioned quarantine guardian shall issue a certificate to that effect. And furthermore, if any of said trees, plants, cuttings, grafts, buds or cions are found infested with insect pests, fungi, blight or other diseases injurious to fruit or to fruit trees, or other trees or plants, they shall be disinfected and remain in quarantine until the quarantine officer of the State Board of Horticulture or the duly commissioned quarantine guardian can determine whether the said trees, plants, cuttings, grafts, buds or cions are free from live injurious insect pests or their eggs, larvae or pupae, or fungous diseases before they can be offered for sale, gift, distribution or transportation. All persons or companies are hereby prohibited from carrying any trees, plants, cuttings, grafts, buds or cions from without the state to any point within the state beyond the nearest point on its line or course to the quarantine station in the district of ultimate destination; or from any point within the state to any other point therein, until such trees, plants, cuttings, grafts, buds or cions have been duly inspected, and if required disinfected as hereinbefore provided; and all such shipments must be accompanied by the proper certificate of the inspecting officer. Provided, however, that after such persons or company have given the proper officer four day's notice, he or they shall not be required to hold such shipments further, without directions from such officer.

RULE 3.—All peach, nectarine, apricot, plum or almond trees, and all other trees budded or grafted upon peach stock or roots, all peach or other pits, and all peach, nectarine, apricot, plum or almond cuttings, buds or cions, raised or grown in a district where the "peach yellows" or the "peach rosette" are known to exist, are hereby prohibited from being imported into or planted or offered for sale, gift or distribution within the state of Oregon.

RULE 4.—All trees, plants, cuttings, grafts, buds cions, seeds or pits arriving from any foreign country found infested with any insect pests or their eggs, larvae or pupae, or with fungi, or other disease or diseases hitherto unknown in this state, are hereby prohibited from landing.

RULE 5.—Fruit of any kind grown in any foreign country, or in any of the United States or territories, found infested with any insect or insects, or with any fungi, blight, or other disease or diseases injurious to fruit or fruit trees, or to other trees or plants, is hereby prohibited from being offered for sale, gift or distribution within the state.

RULE 6.—Any boxes, packages, packing material and the like infested by any insect or insects, or their eggs, larvae or pupae, or by any fungi, blight, or other disease or diseases known to be injurious to fruit or to fruit trees, or to other trees or plants, and liable to spread contagion, are hereby prohibited from being offered for sale, gift, distribution, or transportation until said material has been disinfected by dipping into boiling water and allowing it to remain in said boiling water not less than two minutes; such boiling water used as such disinfectant to contain in solution one pound of concentrated potash to each and every ten gallons of water.

RULE 7.—Animals known as flying fox, Australian or English wild rabbit, or other animals or birds detrimental to fruit or fruit trees, plants, etc., are prohibited from being brought or landed in this state, and if landed shall be destroyed.

RULE 8.—Quarantine stations:
For the first district, comprising the counties of Multnomah, Clatsop, Yamhill, Washington, Columbia, Clatsop and Tillamook, shall be Portland. Henry E. Bosch, quarantine officer, or any member of the Board or the secretary thereof.

RULE 9.—Importers or owners of nursery stock, trees, or cuttings, grafts, buds, or cions, desiring to have such nursery stock, trees, plants, cuttings, grafts, buds or cions inspected at points other than regular quarantine stations may have such inspections done where required, provided, however, that such inspectors shall pay all charges of inspection. Such charges and expenses to be paid before a certificate is granted.

Transportation companies, or persons and consignees or agents shall deliver and cause to be detained all nursery stock, trees, plants and fruit at one or other of the quarantine stations, for inspection as provided by the rules and regulations of the board.

Details as to quarantine stations, offices, fees of inspection, receipts for disinfection and all desired information may be obtained on application to the secretary or any member of the Board, or by reference to pamphlet circulated.
