L. L. Stillwell proposes to accommodate the traveling public this season, and is making full preparations to convey passengers to North Yamhill or Forest Grove, as may be desired.

The Truckee sailed for San Francisco Saturday with a large cargo of lumber and other Tillamook produce. The Truckee is giving a very prompt service now regardless of bad weather.

Preparations are being made by the Firemen for a big Fourth of July celebration. It is intended to have the best celebration in Tillamook that has ever been held West of the Coast Range.

The way the North Yamhill stage came in here Tuesday with a load of passengers is enough to enthrone the old Tillamooker's heart with courage at the annual (summer) revival of good times.

Wm. Eberman and family will start for Seaside, Clatsop county, in a few days, to remain an indefinite time. They will

go on horseback via Nehalem. Mr. Eberman and wife are old Oregonians and know how to withstand the hardships of a trip of this kind. Mr. Eberman has done well in Tillamook and has many friends here who hope to see him reside here again in the near future.

J. E. Tuttle went to Portland last week and purchased the machinery for the new creamery. It will arrive per steamer Truckee from San Francisco. It seems that the deal with Mr. L. Chevally fell through, and the corporation is getting entirely new machinery. The contract for the building is let and everything will be in readiness for receiving milk shortly.

R. D. Jones, a lumber dealer of San Francisco is at the Alderman. He is here making arrangements to buy all the spruce lumber he can get, and will visit Bay City and Nehalem for the same purpose. He also has an eye to locating a mill site for some California capitalists who think of going into the lumber business on this bay. There are good indications of a revival of the lumber business in the near future.

Tillamook Variety Troupe, Letcher, Curtis and Reynolds, will give a show at the Alliance hall next Thursday night, May 16, in which they will give the same programme they gave at Bay City, which is a decided improvement upon the one they gave here. There will be a dance after the show, and music by Handley's band. L. L. Stillwell will run three hacks from this city to the hall on the night of the show. General admission, 25 cents. Children under 12 years of age, 15 cents.

This office is now turning out another 10,000 impression job of printing, all for the Truckee Lumber Co., of Hobsonville. It begins to look as if times were getting a little better—especially in printing offices. It is seldom a poor printer, in this county, gets such jobs, but they have been coming this way pretty regularly lately, and we have the machinery and material to do the work. We are glad to see the stores prosper. They all report better trade, and this helps the printer, for whom we are working principally.

The entertainment in May's Academy by the pupils next Saturday night, May 11, promises to be a very successful affair, and those who know the inside details expect a good performance. The pupils of the Academy should be encouraged by the people here as far as possible, as the school is doing a good thing for the town, and enabling the people of the county to give their children a good education at a small cost. Of course we cannot expect the best of dramatic talent at these impromptu exhibitions, but the admission price is small, so that all can enjoy a pleasant two hours at little expense and assist the ambitious young people to secure a good library.

A petition is being circulated to get the county court to build a bridge across Trask river slough at Captain Stillwell's place, where W. T. Kimball lives, west of town, to connect with the new road to Tillamook river. As the bridge will not cost much it is probable that the county will build it as soon as the road is made good to Tillamook river. The road supervisor will likely cause a just proportion of work to be done on the road, and that, with the volunteer work to be done, will probably put the road in condition to demand a bridge soon. The court seems opposed to building bridges on new roads before the roads are completed.

The H. & L. Co. have appointed a committee, B. C. Lamb, Theo. Steinhilber and J. E. Tuttle, to receive bids for digging wells along First street for fire protection purposes. It is intended to dig as many wells as possible and furnish them with pumps with a capacity of about 40 gallons amineute, before the dry season, so as to have them available for emergency during the coming summer. They have some money they made out of the HEADLIGHT edition, and Mr. M. H. Larsen and Pinky Stillwell have offered some in work, and the proposition is to expend this cash and work for the benefit of the town.

A subscription paper is being circulated to get work or money donated to improve the laid-out road from this place west to Tillamook river, and it is meeting with good success. A little work will make this road passable a great part of the year, in fact as much as the average road in the county, and it would be a great accommodation to those living west of the river. It is expected that at least \$300 in labor or money will be donated, and the Tomlinson boys, or others living on the road are willing to work out cash donations at very low rates to get the work done. This road need not interfere with roads wanted or needed in other quarters, and will be of help to this town, besides fulfilling the pledges of this town to the U. S. government to connect with the light house road at Tillamook river.

C. T. HILLS' MAD FREAK.

He Attempts Suicide Because He Could Not Get Work.

Charley Hills, known as the stallion keeper, Bay City saloon man, and Garibaldi hotel proprietor, tried to kill himself in San Francisco last Thursday, and here is the account of it as given by the Examiner.

"C. T. Hills, one of the most important witnesses for the State in connecting W. H. Theodore Durrant, with the murder of Minnie Williams, tried to end his life by suicide yesterday morning. Hills testified at the examination before Judge Conlan that he was standing at Twenty-third and Bartlett streets a few minutes after 8 on the night of the murder, waiting for his wife, who he expected would come up the street, a man answering Durrant's description came along and a woman who he first thought was his wife met him. The two walked toward the church and he followed. He saw them enter the side door of the church and he peered in after them but all was dark and he went home. The reason he gave for following them was that he was under the impression the woman was his wife. When he reached home his wife was in the house.

Hills was the proprietor of the Garibaldi Hotel in Tillamook county, Oregon, and he sold out a few months ago for a small sum and came to San Francisco. Since then he has been out of employment and his wife has been forced to work as a domestic to provide the necessities of life. He was promised work in a laundry in the Mission, but when the laundry case was called in the Police Court he was obliged to attend to give his evidence, and when he was able to attend the work promised him the opening had already been filled, and he lost all hope of finding such another opportunity. He brooded over his misfortunes and yesterday morning sought to end his troubles by death. While he was shaving the mood seized him and he cut a couple of gashes in his arm, hoping to sever an artery and bleed to death. His act was noticed by his wife and she stopped him before a fatal cut had been made, and a physician was called who dressed the two large gashes in his arm. He was resting easy last night with a policeman for a nurse, and no serious results are anticipated from his wounds.
