Obituary.

Peter Terwilliger died at the residence Mrs. Thornton, Monday, May 13.

He was born in Ulster county, New York, Nov. 26, 1812, and came to Oregon in 1852.

He was one of the few who escaped alive at the Indian massacre at the Cascades in 1855. John and James Terwilliger, now deceased, who formerly lived in Portland were brothers of his. Mrs. Thornton, a sister, is the only survivor.

Deceased was never married, and for the past 18 years he has put in most of his time on his ranch on Trask river.

He was buried Tuesday in Johnson Cemetery.

Fool Financial System.

The system is a mere farce. A silver dollar should contain a dollar's worth of silver, made legal tender for all debts or dropped from circulation.

The impartial, Madrid, says:

"A number of 5-pesetas pieces (41) have been collected and sent to the mint in Madrid. There it was discovered that four different counterfeiters are in circulation. The work is done with such precision that only experts can distinguish between the legitimate and the illegitimate coins. The material taken is of the government standard: 900-1000. It is impossible to say how much of this money is now in circulation, but it has been said that no less than 120 million pesetas (\$28,000,000) are in the hands of the people."

The Epoca, Madrid, thinks that 18 to 20 million pesetas (\$3,600,000 to \$4,000,000) annually are imported to Spain.
