A motion to send the delegates uninstructed was passed, and there was no wrangle regarding the financial question.

The name McKinley was chosen because it was deemed proper to select the name of some prominent and representative republican, it not being the intention to pledge the club for any particular presidential candidate.

Thinks Well of Tillamook.

C. B. Whitaker, representing the well known house of A. Schilling & Co., wholesale dealers in teas, spices, baking powders, etc., of San Francisco, came in last week over the Sheridan road, and after seeing the merchants here visited Nehalem and other points. Mr. Whitaker is a first class rustler, and can get over a good deal of ground in a given time, judging from his movements here. He reports business good, and expects to return to this place occasionally. He had a good chance to make observations and was greatly surprised, he says, to find such an extensive country here with such vast resources and such unexampled signs of thrift.

Getting Out of Debt.

On Monday the treasurer turned over to the county clerk about \$2500 in canceled warrants, and he expects to make another call soon. At present the warrants are all paid up to the 1892 issue, and it is thought a great part of the 1892 warrants will be taken up before tax paying time is over. The oldest warrants now are about three years old while one year ago the county was four years behind.

Two more years of good financing will cancel the debt and cause warrants to sell at par. Among those recently taken up by the treasurer are the "Markley & Savage, present ownership" warrants.

MARKETS.

Wheat—All markets have ruled quite steady during the week until today. Eastern markets show an advance of 1 to 2 cents per bushel.

Oats—The demand is good for choice at quotations. Inferior grades sell at 25 to 27 cents per bushel.

Eggs—The market is steady at 10 cts. There is a good demand with light receipts.

Potatoes—The market is overstocked with all kinds, selling at 15 to 25 cents per sack.

Hay—Choice timothy will sell at \$9.00 to \$9.50 per ton; choice cheat at \$4.00 to \$5.00. No demand for inferior grades.

Hides—The market is firm and still tending upwards. Dry selling at 11 to 13 cents.

Butter—The receipts are large and market overstocked, with all kinds selling at very low prices; brine, selling 15 @ 20 cents per roll for No. 1; store, in rolls, 8 @ 12 cents per roll; choice dairy, 15 @ 18 cents per roll; creamery, 20 @ 22 1/2 cents per roll.

Wool—The receipts are still small. The outlook continues favorable.

Flour—The market continues steady at \$2.25 to \$2.35 for good brands of Valley and Eastern.

Chickens—Old, \$3.50; broilers, \$1.50 @ \$3.50.
