There is no change in the local market. Potatoes are plentiful, slow sale, and command only 15 to 25 cents per bushel. Butter is still in little demand, creamery being worth 25 to 30 cents per roll. There is no sale for dairy butter except where dairymen supply a few regular customers. The outlook for butter is very discouraging until the surplus California butter is worked off the Portland market. Tillamook bacon is in good demand, but the supply seems to be about exhausted and local merchants are shipping bacon and hams from the outside.

It is to be hoped arrangements can be made to hold a grand celebration here on the 4th of July, and sufficient funds should be raised. Rev. Dr. Gue, presiding elder of the M. E. church, who is considered one of the best, if not the best orator in Oregon, especially on Grand Army or patriotic themes, has signified his willingness to address the people here on the 4th if the people desire it. This alone could draw an immense audience. Dr. Gue is in great demand all over the state for making addresses, and the people here will be fortunate to hear him. He will be here on July 6, to attend M. E. conference, and is willing to come two days sooner if the people wish to have an oration from him. Dr. Gue intended to be here on Memorial day, but circumstances are so that he can not get here.
