On this point he was discharged, as not having had the meat in his possession in this county and within the jurisdiction of this court.

Sec. 4 of the amended game laws of Oregon reads as follows:

"Any person or persons who shall hereafter, in the State of Oregon, hunt or pursue elk or deer with hounds with the intent to kill said elk or deer shall be guilty of a misdemeanor."

The fine is from \$25 to \$200, or imprisonment in the County Jail.

MARKETS.

Wheat—Eastern markets continue to advance. English markets are also firm at an advance. Local markets do not gain as rapidly on account of scarcity of vessels and higher freight rates.

Oats—There is a steady demand for choice at quotations. Receipts continue small, at 28 to 30 cents.

Barley—Receipts are small. The market is steady at \$11.50 to \$12.00 for good feed.

Eggs—With smaller receipts and good demand values have advanced to 11c.

Potatoes—The market is overstocked with all kinds. Good are dull sale at 15 to 20c per sack.

Hay—Choice timothy sells at \$9.00 to \$9.50; choice chest dull at \$4 to \$5 per ton. Inferior grades are not wanted.

Poultry—The receipts are large. Choice old hens 6d ready sale at \$3.50; broilers, ducks, geese and turkeys are all dull at quotations.

Hides—The market is firm at 13c to 13 1/2c for dry.

Wool—Valley will command 10 1/2c to 12c, and Eastern Oregon 6c to 10c, according to quality and condition.

Flour—The market is strong with an upward tendency. Good brands of Valley and Eastern are held at \$2.35.

Smoked Meats and Lard—The supply is large with only a small demand. The jobbing prices for hams are 11c to 11 1/2c; sides, 8 1/2c to 8 3/4c; pure lard, 8 1/2c to 9c; country cured sell at lower prices.

Staple Groceries—Have ruled steady during the week. No change in sugar or coffee.

Butter—The receipts continue large. Demand is light at low prices. Brine 15 to 20c per roll for No. 1; store in roll 8c to 12c per roll; choice dairy 15 to 18c per roll creamy 20 to 22 1/2c per roll.

Dried Apples—Evaporated bleached new 3 1/2 to 6c; evaporated unbleached, new 5 to 5 1/2c; sun dried, sacks and boxes 4 to 5c.

Pears—Sun evaporated 5 to 6c.

Dried Plums—Pitless 4 to 5 cents.

Prunes 4 to 6c.

Geo. H. Himes, historian of the Oregon Press Association, and one of the pioneer printers and publishers, lectured on "The Press of Oregon," at Portland recently. Among other things he said: "The first news paper west of the Rockies was the Oregon Spectator, which was issued at Oregon City, February 5, 1840, printed, semi-monthly, by John Flewelling, for the Oregon Printing Association, of which W. G. T. Vault was president; J. P. Brooks secretary, George Abernethy treasurer and R. Newell, J. E. Long and J. H. Couch directors. The paper was

15X22, and contained 16 columns. Mr. Vault, a pioneer of 1845, then postmaster-general of the provisional government, was elected editor on a salary of \$300 a year. While he was an uncompromising democrat of the Jeffersonian school, and never so happy as when promulgating its principles, the constitution of the printing association made it necessary that the editor should eschew politics.

Harvesting in May.

It will surprise our eastern readers, says the Condon Globe, to learn that D. C. Henry, whose excellent farm lies four miles south of Condon, is cutting wheat with a reaper this week. Mr. Henry did not get through cutting last fall when the thresher quit work, so he just left it till this spring. The grain is in just as good a condition now as it was last fall, and will yield just as much to the acre. This speaks volumes for our climate and fertility of soil. This is the choicest portion of the United States, and, considering the large amount of vacant land yet in this county, the population ought to be ten times as great as it is at present.
