Arrangements are being made to put in a telephone exchange in this place, several parties here signifying an intention to use instruments.

Capt. Cary and Dr. Wise returned from their Neastuca springle Tuesday. They report the Big Neastuca toll road in fine condition from Hebo to Dolph.

Dr. Wise left Wednesday for Portland. He will return here about July 1st. He is now going to Portland to arrange his affairs preparatory to moving here.

We know it is in bad taste for a newspaper to be continually dunning people who owe it, but it is in bad taste to owe the printer small bills. We are going to make some collections right soon.

Some boys who were walking down the beach on an outing trip got a young seal. They are walking across the mountain to Portland and were still carrying the seal when they left here.

The treasurer makes another call for orders this week. The warrants advertised this week amount to over \$2000, and the last three calls amounted to as much. The county debt is decreasing quite rapidly.

Fred Page, the painter and artist, has about all the work he can attend to, and has turned out some fine signs lately. He does fine work in decorating and paper-hanging, a fair sample of which may be seen in the Masonic hall.

According to the report of Mrs. Jennie Resher, voluntary observer, the highest temperature in May at Glenora was 85 degrees, and the lowest 20. There was a light frost on the tenth. May was an exceptionally wet month for this region, over 13 inches of rain falling.

Sheriff Jackson has sold his creamery outfit to Joe Donaldson who will operate it this summer and he may also handle the milk for some of his neighbors. The outfit consists of an engine, separator, etc., and there is a set of saws and appliances for sawing wood and ripping lumber.

Several parties were in to prove up this week on their claims, but it seems their notices were advertised in Polk and Yamhill county papers, and the necessary affidavits of publication could not be secured. They may be obliged to make proof again or go to considerable expense, besides the delay.

The Masonic lodge of this place will hold a celebration on St. John's day in this city, and the Bay City lodge will join in the exercises. All Masons in the county will be invited to attend, and a good time is expected. Good speakers

will be present, and a programme will be arranged for the occasion that will be of interest to all who are interested in Masonry. The new Masonic hall will be dedicated at that time. Further particulars regarding the affair will be given in due time in this paper.

Local Market:—Eggs are worth 16 cts. Creamery butter is retailing at 25 cents per roll and there is no demand for dairy butter. Potatoes are worth 25 cents per bushel, or about 40 cents per sack. Potatoes are getting scarce here now, and this is the reason why they are so much higher than in Portland. It now appears that the farmers should have held onto their potatoes a little longer.

It was intended to have the social of the Ladies' Aid Society of the M. E. Church next Friday night, but as ripe berries are scarce, the affair has been postponed until Saturday evening, June 15. It will be held at Fearnside's hall. The object of the social is to secure funds to repair the church and repair it. Strawberries, ice cream, cake, lemonade, candies and other delicacies will be in abundance. All are invited to attend and have a good time.

Parties are now at work on the road from this place west to Tillamook river, and in a short time it will be possible to drive a team over the road. Arrangements will be made to get a bridge across Trask at little expense. This road will probably be open for summer travel to Netarts, and a ferry will be put in soon on the Tillamook river, thus saving several miles travel and avoiding some ugly hills. It is not likely that this county can have too many roads, and we are glad to see this one opened.

The outlook for the races on the Fourth of July is very promising. A number of Yamhill parties expect to be present with some fast horses, and some of our Tillamookers are not asleep. Parties are now outside negotiating for some swift equines and will not allow the Yamhillers to carry out all the prizes. And, there are now some horses in this county that stand a fair show with anything that may be brought in. The days of cayuse races are past here and it takes blooded animals to win a purse.

People in the outside world heard that Tillamook was to have a celebration on the Fourth. About a dozen "Brass Bands" in the various towns of the Willamette valley have sent in propositions to furnish the music for us, and they ask all the way from \$50 to \$200 for the service. For the information of the outside musicians we will say that Tillamook has several "Bands" and some proficient musicians. Perhaps the outsiders knew of Tillamook's fame as a summer resort and thought they would enjoy the invigorating breezes of the coast if they could get expenses guaranteed. The Tillamook Cornet band is willing to go to Chicago and play for the exposition this summer if expenses will be guaranteed.

The new cheese factory started up Tuesday and had 5000 pounds of milk that morning as a starter. It was pretty good considering that the patrons did not all know that it was ready for business. Yesterday, Wednesday, they took in 6,200 pounds. The machinery is working fine, and the manager, Mr. O. Brown, has the reputation of being one of the best cheese makers in the state. The creamery is quite extensive, is fitted out in fine shape, and can handle 9000 pounds of milk each day, or double that amount by running a night shift. A butter making plant will be added to it as soon as the price of butter warrants it. The cheese turned out will be full cream cheese, the milk not being skimmed, and it is the intention to build up a reputation for a first class article, and put Tillamook far in the lead as far as cheese making is concerned.

The firemen started out with the intention of having a Fourth of July celebration and it was found that only \$58 could be raised to defray the expenses, so the matter has been dropped. Those who would be mostly benefitted by having a large crowd in town of the Fourth did not see fit to subscribe much, and it was rather discouraging to try to get others to contribute under the circumstances. The races, under a different management, will come off as advertised, and those who like racing can be accommodated. It would have been a good thing however to have provided for other exercises, but unless the citizens take action and hold a meeting to raise funds at once there will be no speaking or music. There is some talk of a big excursion down the bay, as all the boats could be secured on that day, and the people could celebrate by eating lunch on the sand spit or promenading Nehalem beach.

Dan Bowers on Silver.

Governor Bowers was asked by a HEADLIGHT reporter the other day what he thought about the financial question. He said:

"Well, as to free coinage, I think we can safely coin all the gold and silver produced in Tillamook county at a ratio of 16 to 1 or any other ratio.

"Sawlogs should be redeemable in gold coin, and county warrants should be payable in lumber.

"There should be a tariff on potatoes and the immigration of dudes and star boarders should be restricted.

"There should be a 1/2 differential ad valorem bounty on bear tails, and—well, I don't care to commit myself further, and will say that as to my candidacy for the presidency, I am only a receptive candidate, and am in the hands of my friends."

Mr. Himple is expected from Clatskanie soon.
