CROKER ABROAD

THE RETIRED BOODLER
LIVING FAT.

London, June 16.—Richard Croker is a howling swell sure enough. He is seen everywhere. He is devoting much of his time to society. He gives numerous dinner parties and has a box at the opera. He has a most elaborate wardrobe of the latest English clothing, drives in the park, visits the clubs, haunts the picture galleries and is even seen at teas and fresco luncheons. Today Mr. and Mrs. Croker left for Ireland where the former is to complete the purchase of an estate. The book makers and others were astonished at the way Croker and Dwyer and other Americans bet at the Manchester meeting. They were averse to taking bets from the Americans, who, they say, have no regard for the value of money. Croker, who was looked upon as certain to back the American horse, won heavily on the Prince of Wales' entry.

A correspondent that saw him at the royal races say that upon this occasion all the leading racing magnates—royal and otherwise—were personally acquainted with the New Yorker. In mixing among them Mr. Croker treats the princes and lords just as he would John Riley, Jimmie Martin or any other of his important New York acquaintances whom he might meet at a race course. An eye witness upon the occasion of Mr. Croker's meeting with the Prince of Wales at Newmarket a week or so ago, tells that if there was any offensiveness it was upon the part of His Royal Highness. Mr. Croker, in speaking about this, said that he thought the Prince's manner was more like an American than like that of an Englishman. He never met a more democratic gentleman, and the Prince, he says, possesses that personal magnetism that used to be credited to the late Secretary Blaine. It would appear from this that the bigger the thief the greater the chance of hob-nobbing with royalty.

Cheap Money to Loan.

The following is clipped from the Salem Statesman:
"Good money was never so cheap nor so plentiful in the world's commercial exchanges. It is being loaned in London at 2 per cent interest. That has been the rate of the Bank of England for some time. In New York call loans are one and one-half per cent, with millions idle. The growing Pacific coast can afford to pay more than 2 per cent. interest for money, and there is going to come here before long for investment all the funds necessary to develop the country. There is a great growth ahead of us. Where now three hundred and fifty thousand population occupy the Web-foot state, three million will in a few years throng—and three millions of the most prosperous, happy and independent people on the round earth."
It would be refreshing to see some 2 per cent. money. It's about 200 per cent. here.

Spoiling Butter.

Agricultural Elopist.
Dairy writers frequently caution against placing butter where it will absorb the odors or flavors from decaying vegetables. The worst thing about this is the need of it. But will absorb odors, not only from stale vegetables, but from sound ones, and they impart to the butter a flavor that destroys or overpowers the true butter flavor. A case in mind just now. The writer was supplying butter to the former owner of this farm, and one day planned what was intended for a pleasant surprise, so, before the cover was nailed down, some nice apples with a delicious aroma were placed in the package, separated from the butter by a cloth circle and a layer of salt. The surprise was on the other side. Word came back that the butter was fine i. e., looks, grain and everything but flavor, that was not agreeable.
Now, some butter has an unpleasant flavor that never was near a rosy apple and there was a possibility that the cause should be sought elsewhere, but in due time came a later report saying that the butter was excellent after the surface layer had been removed.
This suggests another point: Consumers should have a suitable place for butter after they get it. If the surface is all the time exposed to the odors of vegetables and kitchen flavors unclassi-

fied, the best of butter will soon get off flavor, and the maker will be under suspicion of furnishing butter that will not keep.
