In the court proceedings of Washington County, as published in the Hillsboro Independent, we see the following: "Application Wilson river boom toll road, for new rates of toll. Dismissed for the reason Washington county has no jurisdiction of a road lying in Tillamook county. Washington county will not establish rates of toll on the six miles lying in this county, and the citizens traveling such six miles must be allowed to do so free of charge."

It was thought that the longstanding fight between the Little Nestucca settlers and the Baxter Toll Road had been compromised and settled. It appears a contract had been signed giving the settlers free passage over the road, but the settlers claimed that toll was collected just the same after the contract had been signed. The fight has begun again, and the county court took action last week that will put the matter in the circuit court, and it will likely be carried to the supreme court as speedily as possible.

The petition of the settlers to establish a county road where the toll road is now, practically obliterating the Baxter road, was acted upon favorably by the court, and Baxters were refused a schedule of toll rates. This will bring matters to a focus at once, and the higher courts will soon decide if the Baxter road is a legal toll road, and one upon which toll can be collected. The county will be to some expense in the matter, but it is supposed that the court intends to find out what are the necessary conditions for a toll road, and make this road and all others in the county comply with them, if they are not already legal toll roads.

Horse Thief Caught.

A young man named Sam Sampson, age about 18 years, of Lafayette, hired a horse at Bewley's livery stable in Sheridan last week to ride to Lafayette. He went to Lafayette, but instead of returning to Sheridan came to Tillamook.

Here he traded horses with Scott Bottman, and afterwards sold the horse he got of Scott back to him for \$6. He then went down to Hank Sampson, his uncle's place, and seemed to think himself perfectly safe.

On Friday A. J. Bewley came over with a warrant for the young man, and after keeping him over night in jail here started with him for Sheridan.

The boy appears to be hardened, and has no respect for law or right. This is not his first offense, but his friends have helped him out heretofore. His parents are respected citizens of Lafayette.

Fire at Forest Grove.

The Forest Grove mill and warehouse at the station burned early Sunday morning. When the fire was noticed first the warehouse was in flames, and the mill just across the railroad burned before any fire apparatus could be got there. It was hard work saving the station houses and other warehouses.

As the station is about two miles from the main part of the town it took quite a while to get the hook and ladder truck and chemical engine to the scene of the fire. The cause of the fire is unknown. The loss is estimated at \$20,000. The mill alone being valued at over \$10,000. The insurance was small. A great many farmers in the vicinity had grain stored in the warehouse. T. C. McNamer, the stage proprietor lost 400 bushels of oats.
