Some people in the Nestucca country have been infatuated with spiritualism lately. It is strange how superstition works, and while these good people may be in earnest, they should halt themselves before they let it get away with them, and before some of them are sent to the asylum. The things that we can see, hear, taste, smell and feel, are sufficient guides for our judgement, and mere imagination shouldn't be allowed to carry one's self away or dwarf the more positive senses.

A man from Amity was here this week looking for a buggy which had been stolen from him, and he thought before he came that a buggy now owned by C. B. Hadley was the one missing, but after looking saw it was a different kind of buggy from what he owned. Mr. Hadley bought the buggy of a man named Davis the horse doctor, who was here with the delinquent outfit with Frank Armstrong, and it will be remembered that a man named Brown, a painter, of Forest Grove was with them and had a buggy which he wanted to sell, but returned to Forest Grove with it. It is said there is an organized band of horse and buggy thieves in the Willamette valley, and that they find Tillamook a convenient place to take their stolen goods to on the start, after which they are sold, traded, or moved to some other place. The thieves generally change tops on the buggies and repaint them, and find more profit in them than they do in the horses. Two who are suspected are in jail and it is thought the others will be run down soon.

All day yesterday and today a large crowd has been standing in line in the court house waiting to pay taxes, and the sheriff was obliged to keep his office locked, letting a few in at a time, in order to facilitate matters. The office was kept open at night in order to accommodate the surging masses who wanted to pay taxes. There seems to have been some misunderstanding and confusion regarding the date when taxes would become delinquent. It appears, however, that today is the last day, though the sheriff's office will be open for a time tonight. After this, county orders will not be received in part payment, and 3 per cent will be added for costs. Some who stood in line nearly all day gave it up and went home, choosing to pay the extra 3 per cent. costs. It is said that some from distant parts of the county came here and bought orders, paying 90 to 95 cents on the dollar, and after all were obliged to go away without paying their taxes. When they do pay they will lose the advantage on the orders, the 3 per cent costs, and will have to sell their orders perhaps, to the same individuals they bought them of, at 65 cents on the dollar, as orders will fall in price when taxes become delinquent.

The prize for — given by Tuttle & Cary, Elva Smith won. The prize given by B. C. Lamb for reading fell to Frankie Drew. An elegant prize offered by Mr. Alfred Williams was overlooked.
