TRUE STATEMENT OF THE NATIONAL DEBT.

The statement of the national debt as reported monthly by the treasury officials at Washington does not now represent and has not for 30 years represented the entire debt of this country. Our national books should be kept in the same way as are the books of all well regulated private business houses. When such business firm has unpaid notes outstanding, it always counts them as debts. If it has assets which are constantly depreciating in value, it deducts the amount of the depreciation from the total of its available assets. Greenbacks, so called, are but promises to pay to holders. Silver bullion which has lost 40 or 50 per cent in value since it was purchased should not be counted at its purchase price in a statement of assets. Mr. Edward Atkinson has revised the official statement for May 31, 1895, to show the actual assets and debts of the United States. Here is his statement:

If this silver is deducted, the net debt will appear to be what is stated in the official figures, to wit: \$1,421,965,942.30.

SMALL CHANGE.

A short time ago the silverites were trying to coin a vacuum. Now they are engaged in spouting free coinage gas with which to fill the vacuum when they get it coined.

One savings bank in New York city has 60,000 depositors, with average deposits of \$200 each. These deposits are loaned out to 600 persons, an average of \$20,000 each. Free coinage would rob the 60,000 of one-half their property to benefit the 600!

It is true that there are many poor people in this country. So have there always been. So are there in all other countries. But our people are better off, on the whole, than ever before. And changing from a gold to a silver standard will in no way increase the production of wealth, but, on the contrary, will tend to check the investment of capital in productive industries.

The statement frequently made by silverites that the cost of producing silver has not decreased, because it costs some companies \$500 or \$1,000 per ounce for all the silver mined by them, is false and misleading. Millions of ounces of silver are produced in Australia at a cost of less than 40 cents per ounce, and in America at figures ranging from that amount to its present price. It is the production on a large scale, and not the instances where a few ounces are mined that regulates the cost of silver or any other metal.

Florida produces oranges. In some parts of the state the finest quality costs the grower \$5 per box. In choice locations on the Indian river the same quality can be grown with profit for \$1 per box. The price in New York and Chicago, however, is not fixed by the extremes, but by the average cost throughout the state of a certain grade of fruit.

Americans must have fads. A little while ago their fad was "Trilby." Now it is "Coin's Financial School." What next?

Silverites never think of claiming that enormous decrease in the price of steel rails since 1873 has been caused by the demonization of the white metal. They are willing to admit that steel has fallen in value because of the new inven-
