Tides are not quite as high as they were last year, owing to the general depression, in fact there is little demand for them.

W. J. May has just returned from a trip to Portland. While there he ordered a new engine for the steamer Girtle. The engine used now is too large, causing a waste of power, and makes more noise than is pleasant to the passengers. The new engine will be shipped direct from the factory in Philadelphia, and it is one of the best and latest improved engines made. It will be put in the boat in about three weeks, after which the speed of the Girtle will be greatly increased and the annoying noise and far experienced now will be no more. The Girtle rides a sea well and is a very fast boat as she is. The contemplated improvements will make her a first class boat.

A. G. ANDERSON KILLED.

He Died from the Effect of Injuries He Received while Working in His Saw Mill.

A. G. Anderson met with an accident Tuesday which cost him his life. He got his right leg crushed completely off, besides being bruised otherwise, and on Wednesday morning died from the effect of the shock and his injuries.

He was working the edger in his water-power saw mill, on Killam creek, when a large belt flew off and became wrapped around the drive pulley. Mr. Anderson tried to catch the belt as it was flapping around, but it knocked him down and under the large wooden pulley. The pulley has a rim and the floor is cut away under it. His leg projected into the hole and was literally sawed off by the rough rim of the pulley and he was otherwise bruised.

One of the Walling boys was at work near by and extricated the unfortunate man from the tangle, but not until the machinery was stopped with a large block of wood, and when Mr. Anderson was lifted out it was seen that his leg was cut off a few inches below the knee, and it was found afterward below the floor. When first helped out he laughed, not realizing he was seriously hurt, but soon fainted away and grew weaker until he died. Drs. Seal and Petre were there shortly, amputated the jagged bones and dressed the wounds, but surgical skill availed nothing.

Deceased was born in Sweden in 1850, and came to America in 1868. He has been married twice and leaves a widow and nine children, one boy and two girls being grown. Misses Telia and Manda Anderson of this place are daughters, and Mrs. J. P. Allen is a sister of the deceased.

The funeral will occur today at 3:30 p. m., at L. O. O. F. cemetery, the services to be held at the grave.

THE MASONIC CELEBRATION

An Immense Throng of Masons Were Present.

On St. John's Day, Monday, June 24, nearly all the Masons, their wives, daughters, mothers and sisters, in the county were present to celebrate and witness the dedication of the new Masonic hall.

Bay City Lodge was here in full force. Tillamook Lodge was all out, the Eastern Star contingents of both places were fully represented, and there were Masons from all parts of the county.

The procession formed about noon on the principal street, and then marched to May academy, where appropriate exercises were gone through with.

There was music by the Tillamook and Bay City bands, and singing by the choir, after which T. B. Handley made a short address. J. H. Bridgeford, Grand Patron of the Eastern Star of the State of Oregon, made a brief explanation of the relation between Masonry and Eastern Star organizations.

Mrs. Bridgeford made a few remarks, and A. P. Wilson gave a toast to the "Lamb Skin." Past Master J. D. Edwards gave a brief history of Tillamook lodge from the time it was founded in his father's barn in 1872 to the present time. Mr. Edwards' father was the first Mason in the county, and the old brass jewels of the lodge, which are valued higher than new ones of pure silver, were made by J. D. Edwards, many years ago.

They were hammered out on an anvil, and the brass was obtained from the old wreck of a ship.

R. R. Hays was called upon for a toast, but he said "Let's go to dinner." J. W. Maxwell and J. E. Shibley were on the program for speeches, but both were unable to be in attendance. After more music the crowd adjourned to the banquet hall of the academy where tons of tempting viands were consumed, everybody having an exceedingly merry time. After this sumptuous repast, all marched to the Masonic hall, where appropriate dedication ceremonies were had. The hall was filled to its utmost, and the ceremonies were highly fitting.

At night there was a grand ball in the Larsen house, and those who delight in Terpsichorean art were fully satisfied. Taking everything in consideration, the affair was a grand success, and all felt that it was a day well spent. The town put on a gala appearance, and from the size of the crowd on the streets, one would think it was the Fourth of July.

Potatoes—Poor quality of old are selling at 12½c to 15c per sack. Good stock would sell at 20c to 25c in a small way.

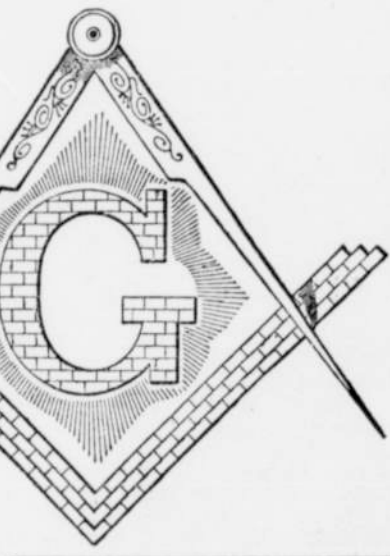
Hides—The market is a little weaker. No. 1, dry, selling today at 14c; green, 6c to 6½c.

Flour—The market is strong with an upward tendency. Good brands of Valley and Eastern are held at \$2.65 to \$2.75.

Receipts continue large, with a good demand for choice dairy and creamery. The outlook indicates an improvement in values for the future. Brine 15c to 20c per roll for No. 1; store in rolls, 10c to 12½c per roll; choice dairy, 15c to 18c per roll; creamery 22½c to 25c per roll.
