HOW PROTECTION PROTECTS.

The following remarkable and peculiar opinion is expressed in an editorial in the San Francisco Examiner, a democratic paper, though having independent proclivities, and we commend it to our readers as worth reading.

"It is generally believed among philosophers that causes precede effects, but the advocates of tariff protections have discovered a remarkable exception to this rule. It seems that the effects of tariff legislation always work backward.

For instance, in 1893 we had the highest kind of protection. The McKinley law had been in force for over two years, and everything that taxation could do for the stimulation of industry had been done.

But the condition of the country had never been more miserable. Factories were closed, men were thrown out of employment by the million, wages of others had been reduced, money had gone out of circulation and the whole nation was darkened by a cloud of bankruptcy.

Well, the distress continued and at last the democrats did what they had threatened to do. They repealed the McKinley law, reduced some duties and abolished others.

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But if he is fully protected from such competition and imagines that he is going to be subjected to it in the future, his energies are paralyzed, his courage collapses and he cuts down wages or shuts his doors.

Since the state of the protected industries, according to our republican contemporaries, is thus purely a matter of imagination, and is entirely unaffected by actual conditions, while the pockets of consumers are touched by only realities, we suggest, as a happy solution of the whole tariff question, that the consumers be given the benefit of the lowest possible duties, while the manufacturers be raised by a corps of trained hypnotists into an imaginary heaven of perpetual McKinleyism.
