Wesley Desart, a young farmer of

resembles a duck except the head. It is
a deep slate color, almost black, with a
whitish face and white horns, or long tufts
of fine feathers, growing back over the
eyes, which are round and small. It
has a very peculiar bill. Next to the
head is nearly an inch long of horny sub-
stance, or nose, from which grows a sal-
mon colored beak, tapering from three-
fourths of an inch in width to a point.
It is a sea-parrot and the claim is made
that it will talk if the tongue is split.
It is webfooted and is doubtless a mem-
ber of the duck family, like Pat's "talkin
burrd."—Statesman.

The Corvallis Times describes the mod-
us operandi of preparing a big clam ban-
quet for the members of the Oregon press
association at Yaquina last Sunday: A
big trench eighteen inches deep will
be dug, and be partially filled by large
boulders brought from Nya creek. The
latter will be heated from a huge fire
built over them, and after the ashes and
debris have been cleaned away, a layer
of seaweed will be placed over them, and
the clams properly cleaned and seasoned
will be piled on. Then comes another
layer of seaweed, then chickens sent by
Manager Stone of the O. C. & E. R. R.,
seaweed, then fish from the salt sea with
another layer of seaweed and green corn,
sweet potatoes and other delicacies.
Then the whole mass will be covered
with seaweed and sailcloth and the
hot boulders at the bottom of the pile
will do the rest. The delicacies will be
served from two huge tables, each a hun-
dred feet long, and with the well known
hospitality of the Newport people, to-
gether with the savage determination of
those in charge to make the occasion
surpass anything of the sort ever seen
on the coast, it is not probable that any-
body in Newport next Sunday will have
his vitals gnawed by the pangs of hunger.
