The Liquor Traffic.

(Written by J. E. Hosmer.)

Together let us investigate the liquor traffic. Is it an advantage to us as individuals or as a nation? Is it a necessary evil? Must it always exist?

These questions crowd themselves upon us and, as we see our friends going down the slippery pathway which leads to weakness, despair, and crime, we feel like doing every thing in our power to induce our fellow men to unite in putting away this worse than useless traffic, which is costing us so much through the loss of labor and mental development.

We hear many complaining of hard times and very often they do not realize that every man who is engaged in this worthless business is being supported by the people, and not only is he supported, but also the paupers, lunatics and criminals which are the direct outgrowth of this fiendish business with all the costs of suits, the expense of extra police and detective force, which we can see is necessarily very large, when we consider that crazy people are daily sent forth by thousands from these legally protected insane-factories.

I do not blame any one particular set of individuals for the existence of this silly business, for it is perfectly natural for men to protect their occupations and the poor saloonkeepers, after they make the mistake of starting in the business, have much money invested and although their logic is miserable, yet they have certain arguments which satisfy their poor clouded minds to a certain extent and so they fight the horrible battle against themselves and their fellow men.

Wherever they have the power to do so they make it very hard for a person who expresses opinions freely which are detrimental to the trade, and with the aid of their blind followers they immediately punish such boldness by calling hard names, by ridiculing his personal appearance, and if by hook or by crook they can find any weak place in the "crank's" character, no matter if they are ten times worse themselves, they will leave no stone unturned until the whole community even the temperance people look upon him with suspicion; and many an honest philanthropist has either had to keep quiet or move out.

Hundreds and thousands of men would cry out against this evil if it wasn't for the money there is in keeping silent, but what is money or estate compared with the satisfaction of knowing that we have had some little part in bringing about a higher state of civilization, of knowing that generations yet unborn could justly praise us for our noble sacrifice.

O, friends of right and justice come out from your hiding place behind the almighty dollar and unite against this manhood destroying traffic.

I know how saloon men must feel about such talk, but I believe that in trying to free them from this galling slavery we are doing them a loving service, in fact, I have the kindest of feelings toward all and I admire the saloon keeper's grit for more than the cowardice of temperance men who, for fear of losing trade or popularity keep their principles locked up in their poor narrow contracted brains.

A man's inherited qualities and his environments may lead him to believe that it is right to make a living by selling liquor. The law gives him the right. No one need drink unless he chooses to do so and in the face of all that has been said and written against the business he goes to work. Poor fellow he soon becomes fit for nothing else and cannot very well change his occupation if he wishes to. If the people would support him and pay him as much as his miserable trade brings, how much better it would be for him and for the public.

We sometimes hear men argue that the saloons make more business and that a town would soon die out without them but it seems to me that any one with a fair amount of common sense can see that it doesn't make the right kind of business. If a man spends \$50 in a saloon he can not spend it for groceries, lumber, meat or clothing and although the saloon keeper will spend part of the money for these things much of it is sent off to buy more poison, to decorate his saloon with obscene pictures or to adorn his noble breast with diamond studs; and the man who does the drinking soon needs public help or at least he robs his family and the public of their just dues in throwing away valuable time and mental force.

An individual, a city or a state must be wise, energetic and temperate in order to reach the highest ideal of success and this deadly incubator of every thing that is corrupt must be destroyed before we can hope to reach a high state of prosperity.

We need not argue, the startling facts stare us in the face. The cost is fearful being more than the cost of food and clothing together, besides it brutalizes and destroys physical vigor, brings out manhood and leaves the body a weak vile dwelling place, but these facts have been brought to our notice so many times that in order to accomplish any good we must do something more practical than to rehearse them and so we had better look around and see what can be done. Many of us believe that this and many other hard questions will be settled by the adoption of the initiative and referendum; but while we are waiting for the people to learn the great lesson of self government, we can prevent much of the evil effects of the saloon cause by boldly advocating its abolition and by instituting moral and elevating places of resort.
