A Righteous Kick.

There is now no mail service between Woods and Hemlock, a distance of about eight or nine miles, except by way of Hebo and Spruce. By this route it takes the mail about a day longer to go from one office to the other as the connections are not good. It takes a letter longer to go from Woods to Hemlock, than to come from Portland to Woods.

From Woods to Hebo, the distance is eight miles; from Hebo to Spruce about eight; and from Spruce to Hemlock about nine; making about twenty-five miles from Woods to Hemlock. A direct route from Woods to Hemlock would shorten the time about twenty-four hours.

The service between Woods and Oretown is also very poor. The mail has to be taken over a very circuitous route between these two points, by the way of Dolph, the distance being about twice as great between Woods and Dolph as between Woods and Oretown; saying nothing about the distance from Dolph to Oretown.—Ocean Wave.

The New Trask Bridge.

The new bridge across Trask river is completed and is being used. It is by all odds the best bridge in the county, and there are few county bridges in the state that will equal it. The main span is 115½ feet long, and the bridge stands fully 13 feet above the highest water mark ever known at its location. It is what is known as the "Improved Howe Truss" design and is strong enough to sustain the weight of a locomotive. The timbers are all large, selected lumber, thoroughly braced for self-supporting, arranged so as not to hold water to cause decay, and the bridge is thoroughly painted. The iron works are extra heavy, and of the latest designing for strengthening a bridge. The approaches are long, easy, and substantially constructed. This bridge, with the approaches will cost the county about \$2500 and fully that much has been expended on the old bridge, counting repairs. The old bridge has lasted eight years, but the new one will probably last three times as long, though occasional painting, and replacing planking

will be necessary. No doubt the old bridge would fall of its own weight were it not for the temporary props under it. It is believed that floods, log jams, or hurricanes cannot disturb the new structure. Geo. Means built the new bridge and approaches. The old one will be removed at once. Its timbers are worthless, but there is some iron in it that may be valuable to somebody sometimes. Clear fir lumber was used in the new bridge, and it is thought that with the heavy coat of paint, it will not decay like the old bridge.

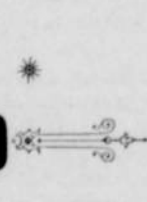
