Father Schell, the new Catholic priest, is out in a logging camp with several other Catholics putting in logs. They intend to build a school here as soon as they can get the material ready. The school house will be two stories high, and 30x60, with a twenty foot addition

for the teachers. A new church 30x70 will be built also, and a house for the priest. Father Schell expects to get about fifty Catholic families to move to Tillamook within two years after the church and school is built.

County court was in session Monday and Tuesday of this week. The Trask river bridge was accepted, and the assessment roll was approved. A number of small bills were allowed.

Tillamook boys are invincible. Several got into the show last night by climbing the fire escapes on the academy building. Some of the boys made as much as 50 cents apiece selling their "door passes" and climbing in.

We learn of some parties who have lost money in the so-called "Family Protective Union." It is the opinion of this paper that the institution is not worthy of patronage, and that those who put money in it will lose it shortly.

The Woodmen should attend the next meeting, tomorrow night (Friday) as there is business of importance. The insurance policies have arrived and those who can't attend should send in enough money at once to pay one assessment.

J. J. McCoy enjoyed very poor health in Lower California, and is now in Missouri. Mrs. Comer and children are also in Missouri on account of sickness engendered by the climate of the peninsula. J. C. Comer still remains in his Mexican home.

A big whiskered fellow named Bragg, who has been working on the jetty, got on a drunk Monday and was gathered in by the marshal. Recorder Drew imposed a fine of \$5.00 on the old fellow, which could not be paid and the man laid it out in jail.

Louis Johnson has traded for the gasoline launch Irene, giving Mr. Hemstreet a timber claim and other considerations. Mr. Johnson is an expert electrician and machinist, and will make a success running the boat. Mr. Hemstreet will remain on the boat a few days.

The new hand pump is a useless piece of machinery. Good wells or tanks would cause the pumps to be of utility. It will be hard lifting to pump water on top of the buildings if the wells are made deeper. The wells should be filled up, and cisterns or tanks made at the corners under the side walks.

Dave Hadley's restaurant building at Netarts was burned Friday evening. Dave and Fred Skomp who were near by working arrived too late to save the building. They had left a fire in the stove, and it is supposed the fire caught from the terra cotta flue. The loss is claimed to be \$700, and the building was recently insured for \$400 in the Home Mutual.

S. W. De Witt, special agent of the Claims Department, of Washington D. C. was here last week to investigate the claim of Wm. Rhoades, of Hebo, for \$1600 damages on account of Indian depredations in eastern Washington several years ago. Jasper Smith and others lost property about the same time. It is not known yet what action the government will take.

M. B. Petteys of Bay City, who had a claim against the Co-operative mill there bought it last Saturday at Sheriff's sale for \$3000. The claims amounted to over \$5000. J. C. Comer, Susan Comer, Bay city Co-operative Co., James M. Fuller and Wadhams & Co., were defendants in the case. It is understood that Mr. Petteys will take possession of the mill at once and begin sawing lumber.

The Woodmen are smiling over their good fortune of having no assessment in October. They are also claiming the best record on the payment of a beneficiary. A "neighbor" at Boulder, Colo., died Sept. 14th at 4 p. m. and his assigns were paid the amount of his assurance at 10:10 a. m. on the 16th. For a man 37 years of age the assessments for the year have so far been \$6.80; for 45 years of age, \$8.80, on \$2,000.

There was a meeting of free thinkers at the court house Sunday. An interesting program was rendered and J. E. Hosmer made his maiden effort to preach. His sermon was well prepared and well delivered. A committee was appointed to arrange for building a hall. A large number of parties have offered to donate money, work, lumber, other material, and one man will give a fine organ to the society as soon as the build-

ing is up. The hall is to be 40x80, with a large stage, dressing rooms, etc., and the scenery is to be painted by one of our local artists who is willing to give his labor to see the project a success. The hall will be well seated, and will have a gallery, perhaps. It will be arranged so the acoustic properties will be good. The hall will be open for use for all kinds of entertainments, dances, lectures, conventions, theatricals, preaching, political speaking, Sunday schools, salvation army, or anything that is not immoral.

S. Hardman and a man named Thomas had the half-witted Level boy arrested Tuesday for shooting at them. They were all fishing, and it appears that Level claimed the other fellows had his net. After passing them a few hundred yards Level fired two shots with a pistol, but says he shot at a bird. The trial took up a good part of Tuesday and Wednesday, in Judge Maulsby's court. Deputy Prosecuting Attorney E. E. Selph appeared for the State and A. W. Severance for the defense. The accused was—well, a bill of costs for the county.

L. H. Brown is putting up a telephone line from his market to the ranch east of town. While experimenting with the 'phones Monday, one was placed in the sample room of the Larsen house and the other across the alley in the sausage room of the Central Market. A number of the prominent citizens of the town were called into Larsen's sample room and told that some one in Forest Grove wished to talk with them. A couple of rowdies did the talking at the other end, and the dupe in the sample room was subjected to a good deal of insolent treatment. There was considerable fun over it. Among those who talked with Forest Grove and Hobsonville are L. L. Stillwell, C. H. Smith, Geo. Cohn, Claude Thayer and J. E. Hosmer. They are aware that profanity and billingsgate goes through a 'phone as readily as business messages.

New Assessment.

According to the footing of the new roll there are 275,056 acres of land in this county, valued at \$855,227, or \$3.10 per acre. The total value of town lots is \$71,958, notes and accounts \$114,925. There are 1164 horses in the county, valued at \$13 each, 6442 cattle valued at \$8.00 per head. There are only 1960 sheep and 980 hogs. There are 755 polls. Total gross value \$1,252,763; exemptions \$124,797; taxable property \$1,127,966.

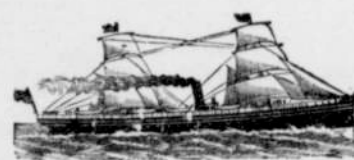

We, your petitioners, earnestly urge you to adopt some measure looking toward recognizing the patriotic Cubans as belligerents, and if necessary, to aid them in securing independence from Spain:

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
