The committee appointed to visit Tillamook City and organize a church, reported that they held a meeting in the hall of the Tillamook academy, Sep. 15. Rev. C. H. Shields preached a sermon and explained the design of the church. The rite of baptism was observed. Elders were elected and installed. Trustees were elected. The church was organized with 20 members. The report of the committee was adopted, and the church was enrolled under the name of the First Presbyterian church of Tillamook City.

Nestucca Items.

He contemplates having vessels stop and discharge his freight while on their way from San Francisco and other places. Cape Lookout extends out into the ocean in such a manner as to afford an excellent harbor for vessels during a storm.

Contemplated Change.

Phil Messner, ever ready to make the patrons of his Tillamook stage line still better satisfied, says the North Yamhill Record, and to do all he can to accommodate the people at both ends of the line, is now figuring on a schedule whereby he can land mail, express and passengers that leave Portland in the morning through to Tillamook the same evening, thereby giving the people of Tillamook this advantage of getting their mail, morning papers, express, etc., several hours earlier, besides doing away with passengers having to stop over night on the road. He is also figuring to make it possible for mail and passengers to leave Portland in the morning and be in Portland in the evening of the same day. Mr. Messner has already given Tillamook an express service that they never had before, by appointing an agent of his own expense, so the people can get their express matter as early as they get their mail. He has not got his schedule complete yet, but feels certain he will be able to furnish this kind of service.

Geo. F. Barton, proprietor of the Tillamook toll road, has a gang of men at work making some important changes in his road, which will shorten the distance considerable and avoid some of the worst hills, thus enabling the stage to make better time. This will help Mr. Messner materially in establishing his new contemplated schedule and add much travel over this road.
