In a recent interview, Mr. Selph, deputy prosecuting attorney, states that for one prosecution instituted by him, three would-be prosecutors are turned away, and that he always insists upon the complainant bringing other witnesses or evidence before the papers are made out. Mr. Selph says he does not wish to shield criminals, however, and he believes there is too much of a disposition to condone offenses against the law and often too much sympathy shown for

criminals, but he does not feel like engaging in prosecutions where it is impossible to secure evidence to convict, or where the complaints are clearly the result of malice. Another thing in this connection, more important than all, the law expressly provides that the county court shall not allow justice's fees in criminal cases, except where the justice has submitted the complaint or information to the prosecuting attorney or one of his deputies, receiving the sanction of the attorney, before the case is tried. If this provision of the law is carried out the evil heretofore complained of will almost entirely disappear.

The Cubans have formed a government and should be recognized at once by the United States. Spain was in such a hurry to embarrass the United States that she recognized the Confederacy immediately after the bombardment of Fort Sumpter, the first battle of the late rebellion.

In a short time the motor road will be done from Portland to Hillsboro, and will be extended promptly to Forest Grove, only seven miles further. It is the intention of Mr. McNamer to put on a stage line then that will enable passengers to make the trip from Portland to Tillamook, or from Tillamook to Portland in one day, and by starting from either place not earlier than 6 o'clock A. M. This will enable the people of Tillamook to read their Oregonians the same day the paper is published, and to get mail through either way in a day of 12 hours, or less time. The people interested in this route will endeavor to get a contract for carrying a daily mail, and it is the intention of Mr. McNamer to put on extra relays of horses and make the time through the same day, leaving Forest Grove after the morning train arrives from Portland. This arrangement will give a daily service between this place and Portland the same as the first arrangement suggested, though it will be a little more expensive and harder on horseflesh. The last plan will be adopted temporarily however, until the motor road is completed to Forest Grove. In case this is done the telegraph and telephone lines will be kept up permanently and in good shape.

PECULIAR ASSESSMENTS.

The Astoria Herald says "that according to Assessor Gibbons roll there is but \$46,095 in money and \$6150 in notes and accounts assessed. What liars some people are. There is one man alone in Clatsop county that has more money than that, and one firm who have double that amount of notes and accounts."

This is pretty hard on counties like Tillamook where people usually give in all their property to the assessor.

Another thing is worked also in Clatsop, Multnomah and other counties of the state, which is unfair to counties which are honestly assessed. The assessors in the counties named, purposely leave off about one-third of the best taxable property, that belonging to good citizens and prompt taxpayers, and the assessing on such property is done by the sheriff. This enables the county to avoid the payment of its share of the state taxes on the property assessed by the sheriff.

Besides, the rich men of the populous counties always keep most of their property off the assessment rolls altogether, what is assessed is assessed much lower than for the poor man, and the honest farmers of the rural counties put up for the expenses created by machine-made state officials.

One blunder of our own is that we have been paying state taxes on double assessments. This trouble will not be of much importance hereafter as the assessors of late have been getting the books and plats systematized so that such mistakes will not occur often.

It is hard however to convince the people that they are robbed on account of their own inaction and the evils we mention in this column will perhaps exist until they get so much worse the people can't stand it.

SARDINES.

There is a big run of sardines at the mouth of the river says the Cathlamet Gazette. This may account for the scarcity of all kinds of fish except directly at the bar. As long as the sardines are in the river, other kinds of fish refuse to travel inland.

M. J. Kinney of Astoria, in discussing the packing of sardines on the Columbia, said: "Several years ago I investigated the subject of packing sardines on the Columbia river and invested some money in the scheme and have all the necessary plant to pack sardines on a small scale. The run of sardines which comes in this river lasts about a month or possibly a little longer. I believe the quality of the sardine to be equal to the Mediterranean article. I believe if the Columbia river sardine is packed with the same degree of care as the imported article and the trade guaranteed of the quality, with a strictly American label, no attempt made to in any manner to deceive the public, that the sardines could be sold. The business could never be pushed except to a limited extent, but it would be a nice little business for some live man. If sardines could be packed for \$6 a case and sold for \$8 there would be a margin in packing. The imported sardines bring \$13 and \$14 a case. Sardines are packed in San Francisco and some towns on the coast of Maine. The goods, I believe to be packed in cotton seed oil and are only worth about \$4 per case."
