The new mail carrier on the new mail route from Spruce to Hembree, is always promptly on time.

T. J. Lucy has a wooden clock of three wheels that keeps accurate time. It is said to be a perfect pattern of the first clock ever made and bears the date, "anno, 1402". It is a novelty.

Coasters are still coming from the valley to spend a few days in the pleasant suburbs of Woods, to dig clams, rusticate on the beach and watch the mermaids as they play around mermaid rock.

Herman Farmer is preparing ground to plant in cranberries next spring. From appearances Mr. Farmer has adopted the most economical method of building the dam to flood his grounds.

Warren Daugherty, wife and daughter, formerly of Tillamook, were in the city one day this week. He intends locating a mining claim on the beach, he is considerably encouraged with the prospects and thinks the mine will pay well.

There should be an office at Dulph, Grand Ronde and Willamina. The people along the line would have a mode of communication vastly superior to our present slow mail, especially for short messages. It is understood that Sheridan will materially aid the enterprise and it is expected that every man in Woods and vicinity will put his shoulder to the wheel and assist as far as he is able. Such enterprises aid in building up a town and surrounding country. Estimates are being made and as soon as the costs are ascertained, stock books will probably be opened for subscriptions.

\$50 Reward.

[We publish the following because a person answering the description of Sidler has been seen in this county, but no one now seems to know of his whereabouts.]

ALBERT SIDLER.

Aged 34 years; height about five feet four inches; black hair; light blue eyes; left shoulder slightly higher than right when walking, body, long; legs, short; weight 135 to 145 pounds; sandy moustache; swings right arm when walking. Was dressed as follows: Black derby hat, brown striped pants, black vest, brown coat, leather shoes, leather suspenders, gray woolen shirt, also gray half wool underclothes.

Was last seen at Lusher & Gilroy's milk ranch, near Hillsboro, Multnomah county, Oregon, September 3, 1895.

Sidler was in demented condition at the time of his disappearance, and was in constant fear of someone trying to kill him. It is supposed that he has hid himself away in the brush in fear of his life and is now lying dead in the woods, or he may have wandered out through the state.

The above reward will be paid to anyone giving information that will lead to the recovery of his person.

Sidler was a member in good standing of Portland Camp, No. 107, Woodmen of the World; and neighbors throughout the jurisdiction are asked to co-operate in trying to find the missing man, and distribute these circulars where they will do the most good.

The North Yamhill Road.

Scott Boatman says the improvements on the North Yamhill road will avoid several of the worst grades, save some in distance, and make a distance of at least an hour in the time of the stage crossing the mountain. Seven men are at work on the cut-offs and Mr. Burton expects to get the changes completed this fall.

The great trouble with the North Yamhill route was that it followed over the highest points, making the grades something awful, and the road bed was always in a worse condition than on roads that followed around a hill side. Those who located the road put it over the tops of the highest mountains where ever they could find them, all because the ground was more clear. It was all right in the time of trails. But it will not do when we want daily mails from Portland. The hard efforts of Mr. G. W. Burton to reconstruct the road will be noticed favorably by next summer's travelers.
