The Nehalem Times says: Geo. Barton, Mr. Martina and Emmet Jenkins, who have worked in Higginbotham & Murphy's logging camp, have bought the Chisholm's camp and will log for Himple & Wheeler. We wish the boys success.

Work on the jetties and dykes in the bay is progressing rapidly yet, and will last about three weeks longer. The excellent weather has enabled the contractor to do a great deal of work, and do it in a good manner. Something substantial is accomplished this year.

The new bank is completed, and C. & E. Thayer will occupy it shortly. W. H. Reynolds assisted by John Stewart, did the masonry. Wm. Mills did the designing, C. P. Rowland and M. Doestler did the finishing, and Mr. Munson did the painting, oiling and varnishing.

G. R. Hughes, Dr. Ward, C. M. Keep and Mr. Wagner, of Forest Grove, who have been hunting on the beach the past two weeks went home Wednesday. They killed hundreds of ducks, some deer, and went home impressed with the fact that Tillamook is a hunters' paradise.

One of our leading merchants says he will land goods in Garibaldi for the Nehalem trade as low as they can be purchased in Portland and landed there, and thinks he can do a little better than the Portland houses. This means for cash, of course; however, butter will be taken the same as cash.

Dr. Wise has returned from Portland where he has been exceedingly busy the last few months. He says he intends to have a good rest, if the Tillamookers do not give him too much to do, and will stay here until after the holidays, perhaps until February. Those who wish work done can find him as his office.

Dr. Wise shot a wild cat on his way from North Yamhill to this place last week. He sent the hide to a Portland taxidermist to have it mounted. He is having specimens of Tillamook game, such as ducks, geese, etc. mounted, and will exhibit them to the Portland sports. He thinks some of them will come over here to hunt as soon as they see the specimens.

A gentleman representing a Portland firm was in this locality this week, says the Nehalem Times, talking up the question of winter fishing for steel heads. He says that a station will be established at Garibaldi and an ice house erected and filled with ice. The fish will be packed on ice and shipped to Astoria on the steamer every week. They will pay 21 cents for steel heads delivered at their

station. This is the first effort in this direction and the success of the scheme depends a great deal upon the weather for if the steamer should be bar-bound for weeks at a time, the fish would spoil. However this could be averted by salting the fish should the weather continue bad more than a week.

The city duds are trying a new experiment on the wells. They are digging them much larger, and intend to make them deeper, hoping to get an ample supply of water. It is feared it is a mistake to expend more money on the wells, as the supply of water from them is uncertain, and if made deep enough to get plenty of water, it will be very hard to pump it to the top of the buildings.

There is an impression that, according to a late decision, tax titles are not good. The decision at the last term of court here involved a title given on account of a sale made several years ago when there was little attempt at compliance with the law regarding levy or advertising. Sales made of late years are bound to hold, and those who think they can squirm out of their taxes on technicalities now, are badly fooled.

Some effort should be made at once to get the snags cleared from the slough. It would cost but little and the government will use a small portion of the appropriation towards doing it if the matter is presented properly. First, the steamboat men should unite in a petition, and then the business men of this place should back it up. A few hundred dollars should be expended every spring in clearing the slough of logs and snags. This would assist in deepening the channel.

Ed Donaldson started to saw some wood in this place the other day, using a tread mill. L. L. Stillwell warned him to quit, or stand prosecution for cruelty to animals. Mr. Stillwell says the horse was falling down every time a stick was sawed off, and that the sight of it was extremely excruciating. Mr. Donaldson desisted and gave up the job. He says from experience he knows the work does not hurt a horse much, and that the horses he was using were extremely balky animals, that would work no other
