We want our rights though. Many of us are proud of the good English blood that courses in our veins. It was that same kind of blood that was spilled during the war of independence. The same kind will be shed again if necessary. We don't want Canada but may be obliged to take it. The average British subject doesn't want trouble with America. The ten-cent lords are the ones who try to encroach on us. They should profit by reading history. Our English-American citizens in case of trouble, will be as patriotic as any Yankee. Too much good Anglo-Saxon blood here, with an invigorating sprinkling of other kinds, to stand any encroachments.

Durrant Will Hang.

Durrant was convicted of murder by the jury on the first ballot, only 20 minutes being consumed in deliberation. He will be sentenced Friday and he will be tried for the murder of Minnie Williams. The customary motions for new trials and appeals will probably give him another year's life. The verdict was received with thunderous applause in the court room. He should be hung at once and the other trial be dispensed with.

Following is a portion of Prosecutor Barnes' speech to the jury:

"The structure which has thus been built, cemented with a mass of indisputable facts, consistent with his guilt, and absolutely inconsistent with a reasonable hypothesis of his innocence, is now before you. It is for you to finish it. Will you crown it with the sublime

form of justice, robed in her garb of law, her forehead bound with the lambent purity, of truth's white diadem, and in her hand the flaming sword which punishes the doer of unutterable sin; or will you leave it to the usurpation of an incarnate hell, to a grinning and deriding fiend, mocking at the paralysis of human intelligence, and hugging to his devil's breast the crime of this dreadful murder perpetrated under the shelter of a church of God and saturated with unspeakable and measureless depravity?"

NESTUCCA NEWS.

(From the Ocean Wave.)

Miss Nellie J. Hayes, of Sunny Side took a homestead near the ocean beach at the foot of Lookout mountain.

Jerry Lewallen hauled a load of salmon to the valley, and returned with a load of grain. He made the round trip in two days.

It is said by well informed persons, that the toll road hauled three loads of gravel on their road last week, somewhere between Woods and Dulp.

We have been informed that J. D. Edwards and others are making quite a showing of the yellow particles of gold taken from the beach sands south of the McPhillip's house.

W. C. King, recently went over to the valley, with a wagon load of Tillamook beef. He says that Tillamook beef, like Tillamook butter and honey, are at a premium in the valley. No trouble to sell any quantity.

Miss Bell Williams, of Tillamook closed a very successful school at Sunny Side, Oct. 24. This is the first term of school for Miss Williams and for the way she acquitted herself this term, there will be no trouble in her finding a situation whenever she feels inclined to teach. During this winter she will attend the Tillamook Academy to prepare herself for still greater usefulness.

It would be much better in every respect if the people in this part of the country could do all their trading in Tillamook county, and patronize home enterprises. There are stores at Woods that carry general supplies and of course they should receive our support. We could not expect them to carry a full line of merchandise, such as is necessary for them to do, for a small transient trade. If we give the merchants here our support they can afford to carry all the goods we need, and it would never be necessary for us to go forty or sixty miles to trade. If from any cause, from distance or otherwise, it is not convenient to trade at Woods, Tillamook offers splendid inducements. Goods can be bought in that city for less money than at most other towns at a great distance. We also mention the fact that Oretown is a good place to trade, when it is not convenient to come to Woods.

There are now several mining camps in operation on the Woods beach, those engaged are old miners and have hopes of making a good thing. There were three rockers in operation last Friday. They have not made a thorough clean up yet. There is any quantity of black sand between Cape Lookout and the Little Nestucca river. No doubt the gold was washed in on the beach with the black sand. The best prospects are found at the mouth of the small streams that flow into the ocean, as where the streams flow the white sand is washed out, and the place filled again with the black sand although there are strata of black sand all along the beach, some of which is covered with the common white beach sand. There is plenty of flowing water for the mining purposes. Mr. Edwards uses a combination of chemicals for separating the gold from the sand. There is plenty of room for more miners and should those at present engaged in mining be successful there will doubtless be many more here soon. The miners are now at work about two miles from Woods, on the north side of Cape Kiwanda.

James Whitcomb Riley has completed a new series of poems in which he varies the treatment of each one to such an extent that they are said to show the Hoosier poet's versatility to a remarkable degree. He has given the series to the Ladies' Home Journal, in which the first is about to be published. A. B. Frost has been engaged by the magazine to illustrate the poems.
