

NATIONAL HUMILIATION.

That Is What We Get Out of the Deal With the Gold Syndicate.

Strenuous efforts are being made in certain quarters to make the public feel under great obligations to both the syndicate and the administration for the financial miracle that is being worked in the United States treasury. We are assured that it is accomplished only by performing the marvelous task of practically suspending the operation of the laws of trade.

No transaction in salvage can be necessary unless a wreck has occurred. It is always impossible to justify the delivery of a ship into the custody of salvors and the payment of a heavy salvage, and at the same time deny that there has been any wreck and allege that the steering and pilotage which preceded the payment of salvage deserve the highest praise. The importance of the salvors is proportionate to the helplessness of the wrecked crew. Praise for the syndicate is blame for the administration.

For an independent government to surrender its treasury powers to a syndicate to be "financed" is a transaction such as may have occurred in the history of the weaker powers, like Egypt, Mexico or the Argentine Republic, but is without precedent in the case of the United States or any other first class power. The attitude in which it places us is that of saying to all the world: "The United States is bankrupt, and there ought, so far as the confidence of the public is concerned, to be a run on its treasury at this moment for gold, but two London firms, in whom the brokers generally have confidence, have kindly taken charge of the case, and we hope none of you have the audacity to attempt a run for gold on banking firms which represent \$600,000,000 of capital."

It is from optimists and enologists of the existing condition of things that these exposures of its weakness came. These destructive descriptions of the actual state of affairs are expected to inspire the public mind with confidence, forgetting that such bulletins of hourly change signed by the responsible physicians are never published except on behalf of a very sick patient.

The artists who paint pictures of the syndicate's power do not seem to perceive that they imply that its power to "hold up" the government is as great as its power to "hold up" the brokers, and that the contract bears upon its face the evidence of being the result of the exercise of such a power unflinchingly and unsparingly. If the syndicate can now compel the brokers not to ship gold when its shipment is profitable, they could last February, with equal potency, induce the withdrawal of gold from the treasury in any required quantity necessary to compel the government to resort to the services of the syndicate, as it has done.

The syndicate can create another run upon the treasury at will, and another crisis, rendering its own services as salvors of the treasury as indispensable as they were in February. After Oct. 1 the right to its good offices will have expired, and the question whether the syndicate will make another borrowing of 3,500,000 ounces of gold by the treasury necessary or not does not seem to depend upon any other exigency than the cold question whether the syndicate would prefer to make \$13,500,000 more out of the treasury or to let the time go idly by without profit.

The exasperating dependence of the United States treasury on external aid from foreign bankers, which is brought home to the senses of every American by the syndicate transaction, is a condition of things which calls the blush of shame to the cheek of every patriot sufficiently intelligent to comprehend the transaction. It is no less than national humiliation. —George Gunton in New York Press.

What Is Wanting.

What, then, is wanting is the men with the old spirit of American independence of 1776, with the courage to declare that justice is the true standard of honor, and that sound money is the gold and silver coin that is named in the constitution as legal tender money and is expressly stated in all our national obligations, except gold and silver certificates, to be the sort of money in which they are payable?

The spirit of loyalty to America and of faithful regard for our constitution inspired all our laws of coinage, legal tender and finance from the foundation of our government until 1873. Then it failed for two reasons. One reason was the grasping greed of Great Britain and her allied stock and bond holders in our midst. The other reason was that our people had sunk their spirit of national independence. —Senator Morgan.

Money Question First.

Keep the money question to the front. It is the only living issue before the people.

I believe in every principle advocated by the Omaha declaration, and I would add 20 more if I were building a platform for myself, but we must have some regard for the 5,000,000 votes we need. Why should we force something on them which is of no consequence until the money question is settled? By taking that question first, which is affecting the greatest number of people, and upon which they are educated and have formed convictions, we will win a victory, give relief and clear the way for the next one which effects the greatest number of people, and so on, until all our demands are enacted into law. —H. France has the largest per capita and the largest aggregate stock of gold. She has \$825,000,000 in gold, while we have \$625,000,000.

The mint report for 1894 says the Bank of France, which holds the money of France in its hands, has:

Gold	\$20,000,000
Silver	\$25,000,000
showing \$45,000,000 more gold than silver.	

The November statement of the United States treasury showed specie holdings:

Silver	\$28,000,000
Gold	\$12,000,000
showing \$16,000,000 more silver than gold.	

It is evident that the Bank of France held nearly 20 in gold to every dollar in silver, while the United States treasury held only 61 in gold to every \$4 in silver.

The Prospective 13 to 1 Crisis.

Suppose a congress and a president pledged to put out cheap dollar scheme in operation once fairly elected. Does it require any great study to see that, from the very day the election result was known, every dollar of our \$600,000,000 of gold and gold certificates would instantly go out of circulation and thereby cause the most violent contraction of the currency ever known? Is it not clear that credit, for the time being, would be utterly destroyed, and a financial crisis precipitated, unparalleled in this generation and probably in all history?

From this maelstrom the country would, of course, in time, emerge. But it would emerge to do business solely on a silver basis, with millions of innocent debtors pressed to the wall long before the new congress could meet to set the scheme on foot; with millions of innocent creditors robbed of a large percent of their honest dues; with every old soldier's pension virtually cut in two and every species of business relation disturbed. —George L. Douglas in Kansas Star.
