Mr. J. H. Hecker, a skilled cheese maker and creamery man of Wisconsin, will be here shortly to take charge of the Tillamook creamery.

Everybody is killing ducks. Even the small boys here handle guns as easily as they do trolling lines, and they come home with large bags of game.

J. P. Allen has fixed up a hall in good shape in the third story of his hotel and dances will be held there this winter. The first dance came off last Saturday night.

Cohn & Co. received a Studebaker spring wagon this week, and will give it away on the 31st of December on the same plan they gave the sawing machine last year.

S. B. Hill, of Duluth, and B. Montrose, of Portland, came in on the North Yamhill stage Tuesday evening. They are saw mill men and expect to engage in business on the bay.

The Tillamook Lumber Co. has just purchased two large saws, and will be better enabled to turn out good lumber. The company expects to put in a shingle mill in a short time and make other improvements.

A man has made arrangements to use the Elmore cannery as a fish station and ice house during the winter, and will take all the steel heads he can get at 20 cents each. It is lawful to take salmon from December 15 until April 15, and

during that time quite a number of steel heads can be caught. Several parties on the bay have agreed to fish, and fish will be hauled from Nehalem to Garibaldi. The fish will be shipped east in refrigerator cars, and will be kept packed in ice here until shipped.

A raft of logs valued at \$500, belonging to J. R. Harter, of Bay City, went out over the bar Monday evening, and was lost. The loggers were trying to float the logs to the mill by hand, but the tide was too strong.

Local Market—Eggs 20 cents, potatoes 30 cents per bushel, creamery butter 40 to 45 cents per roll, dairy butter 20 to 30 cents per roll, packed butter in kegs 12½ cents per pound, flour \$2.75 per barrel. Furs and hides in good demand.

Among the people in town this week were James Hinghey and wife, and L. Fleck, of Nestucca; H. Farmer and C. H. Colton, of Sand Lake; W. J. Smith, of Glenora; Clarence Smith, of Nehalem; H. Booth, of Woods; and Jim Laidy, of Sheridan.

City Marshal Dennis Ryan resigned last week on account of ill health. He has been suffering from the grippe lately and pacing the streets in the night air was too severe for him. Gilford Stillwell has been appointed in his place. The office will be filled by election on the first Monday in December.

The Mill Co. has purchased the lot of Frank Severance, on the corner opposite the mill office, and early in the spring will erect a large double front two story building. Brick may be used in the construction of the block. It will have two large store rooms on the ground floor and halls and offices above.

Dr. Wise will be at his office in Tillamook during November and December, except the first week of December, when he will be at Nehalem. On the first of January he will leave for Portland, to meet appointments there during January and February. Those who wish to see him will please call without delay.

We are informed that as soon as the railroad to Astoria is completed there will be two light draft, swift little steamers placed on the route between here and Astoria, able to make the trip from Tillamook wharves to the Astoria docks in six hours, and that one of the boats will leave each place every day, carrying mail express, passengers and freight.

Election returns—Republicans victorious: Massachusetts 63,000, New York 70,000, Maryland 10,000, Pennsylvania 150,000, New Jersey 20,000, Illinois 30,000, Iowa 60,000, Ohio 111,000, Kansas safely republican. Democratic victories: Kentucky, small majority; Mississippi 50,000. Republican senators will be elected in Ohio and Maryland to succeed democrats.

One day last week this office received from various parties on subscription a cord of spruce limbs, seven and a half dozen of eggs, a kit of salted salmon bellies, three rolls of butter, some clams, two ducks, a keg of cider and a bushel of apples, besides trading some advertising for groceries. It takes all these things and more too, to operate a newspaper successfully.

Sam Downs finally got returns from the butter he sent to Schermerhorn over a year ago. The butter netted him about 8 cents per pound after paying freight and commissions. There never was a time when it wouldn't have brought more right here in Tillamook. At any rate, the HEADLIGHT's exposure of Schermerhorn caused them to ante up a little money.

Mrs. Delia Bradford, wife of Wm. Bradford, who lives on Judge W. W. Conder's place on the Big Nestucca near Hebo, has sent to this office some mammoth potatoes, one of which weighs eight pounds, and several of which were over a foot long. They are very fine in appearance, and could be corded like wood. The yield was over 800 bushels per acre. They are Burbanks.

C. B. Stokes, the Forest Grove operator has hired Frank Bester to keep the telegraph line up this winter and the various operators have agreed to give all their receipts towards paying for the work. This will not be sufficient to keep the line up however, as there should be an expenditure of at least \$50 towards reconstructing the line and placing it on the road. If the line were put on the road, and well insulated, there would be little trouble to keep it in working order. During the summer season just past Mr. Sibley has been out about \$30, besides his time, over and above the \$50 subscribed by the citizens of this place.

Fred Martin was put out of the dance hall at the Allen house last Saturday night. Mr. Martin was a member of the Fairview dancing club, and it is claimed he was instrumental in making it an "invitation club," and that he discriminated against the young men of this town. At any rate, when he appeared at the dance at the Allen house Saturday night Dave Hadley, who is said to be the person who got up the dance, requested him to leave the hall. Martin refused, and there was a scuffle. Some say they fought, and that both rolled down one flight of stairs. Martin was ejected, however, minus his collar and cravat.

Mr. Martin claims that on the dance posters were the words "all invited to attend," and he thought he had a right there. It is said that some of the young men of this town were in the habit of

going to the Fairview dances in an intoxicated condition, raising disturbances which was the original cause of the bad feeling. Dave was fined \$10 and costs by Judge Mauley on Wednesday, and received a strong lecture besides, on account of his frequent appearance in court. It is understood some of the dancers will make up the fine.

The U. S. tide table for 1896 is a much larger book than usual. It has not only the tide tables for this coast, but for the Atlantic coast and all the principal harbors in Europe, Asia, and other parts of the world, besides it contains a vast fund of other information of interest to those who live on or near tide water.

B. C. Lamb has been appointed agent by the government to sell its tide tables, geodetic charts, maps, books, etc., and he gets his supplies direct from the government headquarters. The United States uses its own postal system in transmitting its books and charts, and the first invoice to Mr. Lamb made quite a load for the mail carrier across the mountain. Over 140 pounds of registered matter came to Mr. Lamb Sunday.

The Postal Telegraph Co., which is now building a line to Astoria, expects to extend the line down the coast to Tillamook at an early date. There is also talk of building a line from Sheridan to Woods, and extending it to Tillamook.

There would be no bother from snow or falling timber on either of these routes. Direct telegraph connection with Astoria is needed most here on account of the shipping interests. On this route the line could follow the beach, or the bald hills adjacent, nearly all the way.

The government has a cable across the mouth of the Columbia, from Fort Canby to Fort Stevens, and a cable across Youngs bay, making connections with the line to Seaside and Tillamook rock. This line is used for the public as well as for the government, and it wouldn't take much expense to connect Tillamook with it at Seaside.

There has been considerable speculation as to what will be done regarding fishing since November 1st. It has been generally decided that chums are not salmon and that no prosecutions will be made. The cannery will run until the 15th of this month on chums. If any silversides are fool enough to get caught in the nets they will be thrown overboard. This arrangement is perfectly proper, as it is a good thing to get the dog fish out of the bay, and it gives the fishermen work. Besides this, the chum or dog fish is not so bad, provided you never saw one, and many poor people in the East and in England get a very cheap food product from that source, and there is nothing unwholesome, unhealthy or unclean about chums if properly selected and handled. Their meat is white, they lack oil, and of course wouldn't do for high-toned millionaires to eat, yet they are better than nothing for a hungry man.

City Marshal Dennis Ryan was badly beaten and knocked down several times while trying to arrest Clark Hadley about 5 o'clock Sunday morning. Mr. Ryan's face is badly bruised, but no serious consequences are feared. On Saturday night some of the boys were up a little late at the dance, and after that was over they were skylarking around, drinking a little, and having a good time until daylight Sunday morning. The marshal attempted to arrest them, but part of them got away. Clark Hadley resisted the officer, though, and as Mr. Ryan had no assistance, he was obliged to submit to the beating and not get his man either. Clark is a large and powerful man, and the marshal, though a pretty good man physically, was no match for him, and was sick with grippe at the time. Mr. Ryan was not provided with a club as officers usually are, and he did not feel warranted in using his pistol. It is understood that a vigorous prosecution will be made in this case.
