CITY CONVENTION

THE CITIZENS NOMINATE A TICKET.

The convention held Saturday night
in the court house was the largest city
convention ever held in this place, and
if all the voters present stay with the
ticket on December 2, it will be elected
by a large majority.

The prohibitionists, church members,
A. P. A., whiskey element, populists,
democrats, republicans, mug-wumps,
freethinkers, tax payers, humble citi-
zens, and political wire pullers were all
present.

The A. P. A. was largely in the ma-
jority, however, and about all the nomi-
nees are members of that order. The
church going fraternity and many others
voted solidly for the nominees every-
thing not seeming to care who were
or who were not A. P. A. men.

A. W. Severance was chosen chair-
man of the meeting, O. Hains, secretary,
and Abe Cohn, F. R. Beals and R. R.
Hays were tellers. There was hardly
standing room, and several ballots were
necessary often to make choice, however
there was good order and good nature
throughout the proceedings.

W. H. Reynolds was chosen as the
candidate for mayor, over Mr. Selph by
a good sized majority, however it was
understood Mr. Selph would not take
the office again.

R. R. Hays was chosen as a candi-
date for councilmen by acclamation.
The other nominees for councilmen,
Messrs. Hiner, Thompson, Mills and
Stewart, were chosen by votes running
from 39 to 45 votes out of a total of
about 75. Among the other names
voted on for councilmen were J. W.
Haskins, Geo. Cohn, and J. A. Monroe.
For Recorder, Henry Alderman re-
ceived 45 votes out of 65. C. N. Drew's
name was used also, but it is under-
stood Mr. Drew doesn't care to serve
in that office any longer.

Fred Arthur and Geo. Johnson were
voted on for marshal. Mr. Arthur re-
ceived 44 votes of 79.

There were several ballots for treas-
urer, and once there was a tie between
Geo. Cohn and Geo. Edmunds. Then
Abe Cohn announced that Geo. Cohn
would not accept the office, and Mr.
Edmunds was chosen next ballot.

It is thought the men nominated will
give the city a progressive, economical
administration, and will not in any way
meddle or interfere with the rights of
the people or show any radical cranki-
isms.

It is also supposed to be a law and or-
der ticket, and recent occurrences in
the city are perhaps the cause of the
large attendance.

The only thing to mar the proceedings
was that some fellow voted five or six
tickets at a time in several ballots.

The HEADLIGHT is not an A. P. A. or-
gan, and no one about the office belongs
to the order, yet this paper stands aloof
from creeds, doctrines or religious prej-
udices, and will support the ticket on
its merits, regardless of issues or personal
feeling believing the nominees to be
fair, level headed men, who will give
the city a good government, and regard-
less of fear or favor.

Joaquin Murrieta.

Murrieta dressed after the fashion of
the day, and was a typical Mexican on
horseback. His hat, or sombrero, was
plumed with black feathers, his pan-
taloons and jacket were of fine black cloth
and the jacket was braided with gold.
He rode a magnificent steed; the Span-
ish saddle being ornamented with silver.

He frequently visited the towns in
disguise, with one or two attendants, to
dance at the landlugs, flirt with the
senoritas, play monte, and if unsuc-
cessful raid the bank. While Murrieta was
at a monte table in Marysville, a brag-
gart said he would, "Just give one thou-
sand dollars for a chance at that greaser,
Joaquin."

In a spirit of recklessness, Murrieta

sprang upon the table, bowie-knife in
hand, and shouted: "You cowardly
gringo, look, I am Murrieta."

The man trembled and the crowd
stood back in amazement. Murrieta
then walked out of the room, his asso-
ciates covering the crowd with their re-
volvers. Under various disguises he
entered towns, sought out persons who
had betrayed him, and while in the act
of stabbing them to death, uttered,
"Joaquin."

Perhaps the most daring act was that
at Stockton. The Governor had offered
a reward of five thousand dollars, "dead
or alive, for Joaquin Murrieta." Dis-
guised, he rode into town, and seeing a
crowd reading a placard, he rode up.
Reading it, he dismounted and wrote
underneath:

"I will give \$10,000 myself. Joaquin
Murrieta."

In a moment he had remounted, and
as his horse swiftly sped away, he turned
in his saddle, and with a dagger in
his hand, shouted, "Carajo, gringos!"—
J. M. Scanland in November Overland.

Turkey should be gobbled up, receive

The county clerk has completed copy-
ing the assessment roll and it has been
sent to the Secretary of State and the
State Board of equalization will soon
begin its work.

Last Sunday was a very dry day.
The saloons were closed. However,
somebody was prepared with liquor, as
some showed the effects of it, and some
minors were intoxicated.

The next legislature should pass a
law absolutely protecting Mongolian
pheasants for the next four years in
Tillamook county. Some other coun-
ties have a law of that kind.

It seems the game laws of this state
are arranged solely for the crack sports-
men of the large towns. The unskilled
country greenhorns who want to kill a
little game for family use, or who wish
to sell game occasionally to procure a
few groceries, are not in it. The dudes
from the cities kill game in a wholesale
way and supply the restaurants of the
cities.

Our plate matter page has both sides
of the money question presented. One
column is for gold standard and the
next is for silver. In a short time ar-
ticles pro and con on the tariff will be
given. The free trade or tariff reform
idea is pretty well settled just now, but
the best way in the world to arrive at
correct conclusions is to give both sides
of the question.

The State Insurance Company of Salem
has failed and is in the hands of a re-
ceiver. The company presented a draft
for \$10,000 on its bank, Williams & Eng-
land, of Salem, and as the bank was
short of funds couldn't pay it. The
bank immediately "busted" and, of
course, the State Insurance Co. had to
"bust" also. The editor of this paper
is very careful in its dealings with banks
and never draws out such large sums at
one time for fear of breaking the bank.

Carl Hunt, who was deputy sheriff
under J. D. Edwards, is on the Yukon
in Alaska. He is trying his luck in the
mines, but is not known what success
he has made, as there is communication
with that country only about twice a
year, there being none in the winter.
Last time he wrote to his folks here he
told them to write to him about Christ-
mas, and that he would get the letter
the following April, or later. He did
not have good success in the Kaslo, B.
C., mining districts, and went to Alaska
several months ago.

Col. Craighill, head of the war de-
partment, as far as harbor appropri-
ations are concerned, in his last recom-
mendations, asks for \$25,000 for Sitka
the same for Yakima, \$475,000 for Hum-
bolt, and Coos, which has received nearly
a million is to have \$95,000. Tillamook
is not mentioned. It may be an
oversight, but people here should send
in a vigorous demand at once, as this
place is more deserving than any of the
others, and has received much less.
What are our congressmen doing? They
should be reminded that Tillamook
county has already brought \$800,000 in-
to the U. S. treasury from the sale of
timber lands, and that we should have
at least \$100,000 to assist us in market-
ing the timber.

Most dairymen in this county are
very careful in making butter, however
there are a few yet who are very care-
less. They are selling their butter on
the reputation of Tillamook butter, and
are greatly injuring the demand for the
product of this county. Occasionally
somebody puts butter on the market
which is dirty, rancid, watery, of poor
color, horrible in appearance and smells
to heaven. It is an outrage and there
ought to be some way to prevent it.
There ought to be a dairy inspector, and
he should be empowered to brand such
butter as "Axle Grease." It is of the
utmost importance that all of the dairy-
men of this county use every precaution
to make none but clean wholesome, del-
icately flavored, nice appearing butter.
The merchants should refuse to handle
any that is not good. This article is
not intended to reflect on the careful
dairymen of this county, but to spur up
some of the careless ones for the protec-
tion of all.
