NESTUCCA NEWS.

(From the Ocean Wave.)

Cape Kiawanda is situated south of Sand Lake and north of Nestucca bay, and is so named from an old aboriginal chief of that name who resided here many years ago. It is picturesque and extends well into the sea. Haystack rock which covers several acres of ground, and is between three and four hundred feet high, stands from it perhaps a mile. It is thought they were at one time connected, but through the lapse of lengthy ages and the wear and tear of the elements they were separated. There is now deep water between the mainland and the rock.

Early last Friday morning a three masted ship was seen apparently trying to come in across the sand spit into the Nestucca bay, about a mile north of the mouth of the bay. It seemed to have no difficulty in getting pretty well into the breakers, but the wind becoming unfavorable it could make no further headway toward the beach. It remained in the break-until in the afternoon, when the sails were hoisted and it moved off southward. We thought perhaps the boat was insured, but were not positive as to that, as we had no means of ascertaining only by its movements. We do not know the name of the ship. It seemed to not be loaded. Sailing vessels should be careful how they try to come ashore here, as several boats have been wrecked along this beach.

The Nestucca beach is without a doubt one of the nicest and most useful places on the coast. All testify to that, not only the people here, but also those of other states and countries. Great masses of humanity collect on it in the summer and other things in the winter. Vehicles of every description, bicycles, race horses, pretty girls and other people, break the monotony and lend variety to the scenery during their season. The music of wild fowls makes it charm-

ing in the winter, and the songs of the mermaids enticing in the summer. The friendly sea lion may be seen near Cape Kiawanda playing hide and seek, and basking in the warm sunshine at the base of Haystack rock. But the most important matter in connection with this beach is its popularity as a place for accidentally stranding worthless and worn out but heavily insured sailing vessels. There are miles along the beach in many places with scarcely a rock to hurt a vessel as it comes bounding on the beach at high tide, so that it can almost be left high and dry on the sand, without any great damage. Several mariners seem to have been quite well acquainted with this beach, as a number of vessels have been wrecked here without any danger or damage to anyone, not one of the boats struck a rock, or reef, nor anything more solid than sand and the sailors have had no difficulty in getting safely on terra firma, with their baggage and valuables. The marine insurance companies are doing an excellent work in placing a good price on the vessels to be paid as soon as they are wrecked. But it seems it would be more humane to purchase the vessel outright and turn them loose among the rocks and reefs along some rugged and rock bound coast to work their own destruction, than to require people to put their lives in jeopardy in doing this work, even if it is to be done on the beautiful beach of the Nestucca.
