The steamer Harrison arrived last Tuesday from Astoria where she had been barboned for several days. She was loaded to the guards with freight, over 80 tons being left of this port. On Thursday she sailed for Siuslaw with freight and will take out from that port the cannery outfit and Chinamen from Elmore's cannery.—Nehalem Times.
Lloyd Montgomery practically admitted all that had been charged against him when he said that he killed McKercher after McKercher had killed his father and mother. This story would have seemed highly improbable at the beginning in view of all the circumstances. Its telling at this time stamped it as surely false. Had the boy killed the murderer of his father and mother, he would not have concealed the fact for a single moment.—Oregonian.
The Alliance Market closed its doors to business Tuesday. The reason assigned is that the market did not pay. This leaves the field to Mr. L. H. Brown. Mr. Brown says he doesn't intend to raise the price of meat at all, and will serve the public as well or better than ever. He has always endeavored to succeed by fair dealing and hard hustling. Mr. Deery who managed the Alliance shop made many friends while here and it is to be hoped he may find some congenial and profitable employment that will enable him to remain with us.
A recent dispatch in the New York World says: A dispatch received yesterday from Philadelphia announced that Arthur Jack, of No. 406 Sixth avenue, of this city, had committed suicide. He was but 17 years old, a son of John Jack, the well-known stock actor, and cousin

of Rowland Reed. The dispatch said: "About 10:30 A. M. employees of the mint were startled by the crashing of glass. Looking out of the window they found that the sound was caused by the falling of a human body from a point far above them, and at the bottom of a light well they saw the mangled body of Jack, who had thrown himself from a window on the eleventh floor of the Betz building. No cause for his suicide is known."
The trial jury is to report for duty in the United States court this morning. The first thing that United States Attorney Murphy will call is attention to the case of the schooner Louis Olsen, charged with illegal sealing within the prescribed zone around the Brihlov islands. Lieutenant Cunwoody, who captured the schooner, is to arrive here today from San Francisco, as he is the principal witness in the case for the government. It is understood that the result of the trial will to some extent depend upon the credence given to the correctness of his observations, as compared with those kept on board the schooner. Her captain claims that, when captured, or at least when he did his sealing, he was outside of the zone.—Oregonian Nov. 25.
Arresting Fishermen.
One of the recent dispatches says: Constable Linton for Florence with warrants for the arrest of the proprietors of the two salmon canneries at the mouth of the Siuslaw, who are charged with violating the laws regulating the taking of salmon at certain seasons. The close season on that river commenced November 1st, but information reached the officers here that the law was being violated and the canneries were in operation. After accumulating evidence supposed to be sufficient for conviction, warrants were issued, alleging specific violation of the law since November 1st. It is probable that many of the fishermen supplying the canneries will be arrested.
The fishing laws for Siuslaw are the same as they are for Tillamook, and they are of no protection whatever. The officers should not enforce them unless it be to arouse to people to remove a useless and outrageous law from the statutes.
It does no good particularly to limit the season here, and the Sunday law is of no utility. They may be good in theory, but in practice they are not.
A law setting off Wilson or Kilehs rivers to be protected against fishing for salmon at any season, and a small appropriation for hatcheries on protected streams would do some good.
