DAIRY INTERESTS

VIEWS OF AN EASTERN CREAMERY MAN.

Mr. J. D. Hecker, who has recently
come from Wisconsin to take charge of
Tillamook Creamery, has given us a few
of his ideas regarding the comparative
merits of Tillamook and the portions of
the East as dairying countries.

Mr. Hecker has had ample experi-
ence in some of the best dairying re-
gions of the Eastern states and Canada.
He has also taken full courses in train-
ing schools for dairymen, besides he
makes a careful study in a scientific
way of the subject of making butter
and cheese.

Mr. Hecker says he hasn't been here
long enough to yet arrived at definite
conclusions in every particular. How-
ever, from what he has observed, he is
of the opinion that this country is equal
to the best dairying regions of the East.
Mr. Hecker has closely studied the re-
sults in the experiments he has made,
and finds the butter here to have a fine
body or grain, and every indica-
tion of securing that exquisite nutty
flavor, under proper conditions, which
marks the degree of superiority in the
product turned out by some of the fancy
butter makers of the East.

Mr. Hecker thinks a most excellent
quality of cheese can be made here also.

The advent of experienced and
well informed creamery men here will
be of great help, and the managers of
the creameries here, Messrs. McIntosh,
Rogers and Hecker, are certainly ex-
perts in their business. There are no
better in the state of Oregon, and while
they are not conducting dairying
schools, their presence causes consid-
erably healthy rivalry, causing several
small creameries to excel in their prod-
uct, and inciting many dairymen to
produce better butter.

City Council Meeting.

The new council met Monday night
for the first time. The councilmen
were all present except F. R. Beals who was
in Portland on business. R. R. Hays
was chosen president of the council.

A. W. Severance was appointed city
attorney.

City marshal allowed \$30 per month
for staying on duty from 9 o'clock in the
morning until 12 o'clock at night. The
marshal is to receive extra wages as
street commissioner and fees on dog
taxes etc.

Recorder's salary fixed at \$10 per
month.

The reports of the outgoing recorder
and treasurer were read and referred to
a committee consisting of Councilmen
Beals, Stewart and Thompson.

The time of meetings was set for the
first and third Monday nights of each
month.

After some minor business the council
adjourned.

The following is the mayor's message

MAYOR'S MESSAGE.

To the Common Council of Tillamook
City, State of Oregon.

It becomes the duty of the mayor, at
the first regular meeting of the board to
communicate by message to the
council a general statement of the con-
dition of affairs of the city, and to re-
commend such measures as he may deem
necessary for the welfare of the city.

I find on referring to the annual re-
ports of the treasurer and recorder for
the year ending December 31, 1895, the
following:

Receipts from all sources, turned in treasury.....	\$1163 75
Amount warrants drawn to December 1, 1895.....	1166 15

Balance.....	58
Grand fund, unavailable for general purposes.....	11 50

Total..... 12 15

Since submitting treasurer's report,
there have been bills presented, allowed
and warrants drawn: to the amount of
\$92.56, which leaves an indebtedness
amounting to \$91.98. For further in-
formation I refer you to report on file in
recorder's office.

There has been expended quite a large
amount of money for the equipment of
the fire department during the last
year, and while it is a stride forward in
the right direction, our pumps and ap-
paratus are inadequate for the needs of
the city. I would therefore suggest
that the council keep that end in view
and eventually bettering our system of
fire protection.

There seems to be no system of sew-
erage. I would suggest the adoption of

some plan for the better drainage of the
city. As a great many people have filled
in the natural channels between the
street grades and curbs or sidewalks with
gravel, for approaches or drive-
ways, I would therefore recommend
there being an ordinance being passed
compelling them to open such places
and keep them open by culverts or other
means.

I would also recommend that when-
ever it becomes necessary to make im-
provements in the way of sidewalks or
graveling streets, that the city take
charge of and be to the expense of
laying all crosswalks, gravel the ap-
proaches to the same, also all squares
or intersections of streets.

Complaint having been made of an
open gravel pit in the western part of
the city, the same being a source of an-
noyance and a menace to life and limb,
I recommend that you take the proper
measure to have said gravel pit prop-
erly enclosed.

I would recommend the appointment
of A. W. Severance as city attorney for
the year 1896, his salary to be a reason-
able compensation for services rendered.

The Electric Light Company have
submitted a proposition for your consid-
eration. They offer to furnish the city
with five arc lights one year on a moon-
light schedule for \$35 per month, and if
the city can afford it, I would suggest
more light.

NEWS GATHERED EARLY IN THE WEEK.

The HEADLIGHT is anxious and gener-

ing a delay in receiving supplies.

Word has come that the Woodmen
will have no assessment this month.
The notice of the assessment was sent
out, but was countermanded later. The
increase in membership has been so
great in the past month that no assess-
ment was necessary. The order in this
jurisdiction has been increased from
14000 to 18000 members during the last
year. The camp at this place is about
45 strong, and about 25 new members
coming in this month. The members of
this camp are rustling for all there is
in it.
