RADICAL LAWS.

South Carolina has for a long time held a unique position as the only state in the Union which refuses to grant divorces from any cause whatsoever. It is exceedingly interesting to note the fact that the new constitution does not alter the state's policy in this regard. Marriages between the two races are absolutely forbidden. The age of consent is fixed at fourteen. Married women are accorded full rights of property. The sections in which these four rules are laid down read as follows:

Divorce from the bonds of matrimony shall not be allowed in this state.

The marriage of a white person with a negro or mulatto or a person who shall have one-eighth or more negro blood shall be unlawful and void.

No unmarried woman shall legally consent to sexual intercourse who shall not have attained the age of four teen years.

The real and personal property of a woman held at the time of her marriage, or that she may thereafter acquire, either by grant, gift, inheritance, devise, or otherwise, shall be her separate property, and she shall have all the rights incident to the same to which an unmarried woman or man is entitled. She shall have the power to contract and be contracted with in the same manner as if she were unmarried.

AGAINST ATHEISM.

Among other miscellaneous matters come in Article XVII. of this remarkable constitution, there is retained from former constitutions the following perpetuation of the old-fashioned disabilities deemed necessary to protect citizens against atheism.

No persons who deny the existence of a Supreme Being shall hold any office under this constitution.

Such provisions, well meant though they be, are more likely to provoke doubt in the minds of half educated young men of good conscience but unsettled convictions, than to promote reverence and strengthen faith.—From "South Carolina's New Constitution," by Albert Shaw, in the January Review of Reviews.

A DANGEROUS PRACTICE.

Some of our young Jersey heifers were sent to mountain pasture and while there, and at the age of 8 to 12 months, were served by a bull on the range.

After calving, on their return from pasture, we are drying them up as soon as possible, and also intend that they should not be bred again for six months or so, because we think they were too young when first bred.

Will you kindly tell us whether we are doing right in adopting this course? P. & H. San Gabriel, Cal.:

From our point of view your course is diametrically wrong. Without being able to give any better reason therefor than a lingering respect for the customs of other days, we have adopted for our own guidance the age of 24 months as about the best period for a heifer to freshen, and, al-

though we have no exact records to quote in support of the opinion, we should prefer to have the heifer freshen six months earlier than six months later. By an accident similar to the above, one of our most promising young cows dropped her first calf when only 16 months old and was milked thereafter regularly. Neither that calf nor the heifer, now about 4 years old, show any unfavorable results from this early maternity.

Then the drying off with first calf will tend to establish the bad habit of a short milking period, and in addition this violent interruption of the ordinary course of nature, like the drying off of a persistent milker, will be likely to occasion physical changes in the udder that will interfere with the future usefulness of that organ.—Hoard's Dairyman.

CO-OPERATIVE CREAMERIES, AND OTHER QUESTIONS.

What is the best method of establishing a co-operative creamery where there is a number of small separators?

Will someone give the workings of a co-operative creamery? On paying for milk by the test at an individual creamery where one pays, say, twenty to twenty-five cents per pound for butter fat, should the percentage over the test be given the patrons or not?

What test is used for determining the acidity of cream? What is the proper acidity for making first-class butter?

Would ensilage be a profitable feed made from alfalfa where one can have the same green for grazing the year round?

What is the feeding value of sweet potatoes as a butter producer with alfalfa hay, and bran shorts?

A co-operative creamery is established and run just as any other co-operative business may be established and run. It may have much or little machinery. Our personal preference is for few rules. Get an estimate of the cost of building and equipping such a creamery as will be required. This will probably be considerably more in Arizona than in Wisconsin or Minnesota, but should come within \$4000 there. Let the men who are willing to co-operate raise this money, and select a manager and give him full control under such rules and regulations as the subscribers may adopt. When completed, and a competent butter maker is in charge, send out and gather in the cream, sell the butter, lay aside a small per cent for repairs and a sinking fund, deduct all expenses, and distribute the balance of the money according to amount of fat furnished by each subscriber. If any non-subscribers wish to deliver milk or cream do not refuse them, but take it in and charge them from 25 to 50 per cent more than the actual cost to the contributing subscribers.

When the agreement is to pay a stipulated price for butter fat, the surplus or a er run belongs to the creamery.

Any roots or tubers make an excellent addition to a ration where only dry fodder and grain are fed, but sweet potatoes are worth only about 50 per cent more than turnips.—Hoard's Dairyman.
