FROM HOARD'S DAIRYMAN.

The following items of interest to this county have been selected from Hoard's Dairyman. That journal has every week about 20 pages of matter just as interesting:

Why did Denmark send to the United Kingdom last year 86,000,000 pounds of pork and 97,000,000 pounds of butter, exporting over \$28,000,000 more of farm products than it imported in a corresponding period? This little country supplies more pork to the United Kingdom than all the other countries of Europe combined; in that item she is next to the United States. Two reasons for this are foremost in our mind. 1st, the Danes are rigidly careful as to the quality of their bacon and butter. 2nd, The Danish Government keeps two able and experienced commercial agents in England, one at London and the other at Manchester, whose especial business is to look after the Danish trade and afford all assistance possible to Danish shippers. Would it not richly pay the United States government to inaugurate something of this kind for our producers?

If oleomargarine is that healthful delicious product which manufacturers and their chemists represent it to be, why not adorn the packages and wrappers containing it with a picture of the inside of a slaughter house with its rows of dead hogs and beavers on one side of a room, and the rendering tanks on the other side?

The Dairy and Food Commissioner of Minnesota has seized a car load of butterine at Duluth, amounting to 25,000 pounds and belonging to the Armour Packing Co., of Chicago. The Minnesota law requires that the stuff shall be colored pink and Armour did not so color it.

Nearly all the large dealers in oleo in the principal cities of Pennsylvania have agreed to stop the sale of the goods. They will hereafter keep the real thing.

A California paper complains bitterly of the low prices of dairy products the past season and says there is no hope for the dairy farmer, except in the direction of higher prices for butter. We beg to differ. The greatest hope for the dairy farmer, if he will only see it, lies in the direction of reducing the cost of making the butter. There he is master of the field. When he keeps two cows to do the work of one, what hope can he have under any reasonable price for butter?

The various creameries of Freeborn Co., Minn., paid from 77 1/2 cents to \$1.05 per 100 pounds of milk for butter fat for November.

CORRESPONDENCE.

One of the features of Hoard's Dairyman is the extensive correspondence, almost half of it being questions from correspondents and editorial answers thereto. The following is selected from the correspondence:

"In November we began selling our milk to a certain creamery and I at once began taking a composite sample—taking a small quantity of milk from each milk-

ing and preserving it with potassium bicarbonate. The creamery was running every other day, a pipette one-third size was used, making one test a week, missing the milk from one day. The first week showed a difference in the creamery test and my composite test of 7 per cent fat. I could account for it in no way; knew the man who did the testing at the creamery to be perfectly honest and above suspicion, and as I had learned testing from Dr. Babcock himself, had done considerable testing during the summer. Had found some patrons delivering milk at a cheese factory where milk was pooled, which tested 2.5 per cent while their neighbors were sending milk from 3.5 to 4.3 per cent fat. Had found several cows in my own herd that were giving milk that contained from 2.8 to 3.2 per cent fat. Have churned several times, setting milk in shallow pans, and got from 10 to 12 per cent over oil test and leaving from .5 to .7 per cent fat in skim milk, so I thought that my own testing was reasonably near, if not quite correct. So I started out to find where the trouble was.

I first told the creamery man the difference was too great. He next took out a full sample from the two days' milk as delivered at the creamery, while I again made a composite test; difference 5 per cent fat. I next took a carefully prepared composite sample, using each bottle in my tester; no difference. The creamery man took a sample of this milk as delivered at the creamery with his own pipette and put in his own test bottle and sent out to me. No difference from the composite test and my own bottles, while his test taken at the same time, showed .5 per cent difference. I next took some of my composite sample to the creamery and tested it there myself; difference, .5 per cent from when I tested at home, although the same bottles were used. Found that the water used at the creamery contained considerable lime and other impurities. I took some of the acid used at creamery home, and found no difference when used my tester with pure rain water. Thus I have proven that the trouble was due to the water in the water used in the tester, I using a hand machine at home, at creamery a power machine. I shall find out just what it is before I get through with it.

A composite sample tested at home 4.9 per cent fat, at the creamery 4.4 per cent fat. A sample of the same milk was sent to a prominent dairy school where it was tested, I think, about 10 days after the last fresh milk had been added. The report was, "The sample was small and churned some, it showed 4.66 per cent fat."

My cows have done exceedingly well this year, although I cannot yet give the figures. Last year they made 306 pounds per cow, and the product is much above that, this year. All my matured cows will make two pounds a day, the best making fifteen and three-fourths pounds in seven days. She gave fifty-seven pounds of milk in twenty-four hours, and made fifty-five and one-half pounds of butter in thirty days, and still continued at the same rate for some time. Her udder measured fifty-four inches around after giving milk for three and one-half months.
