for creameries, and the Willamette

apples, sheep, and some other  
things we admit, but for butter,  
cheese, fish, lumber and vegetables  
the Willamette valley is not in it.  
Our valley friends should consider  
that we can produce butter here  
for half the cost that they can on  
account of the perpetual grass here,  
and the flavor of the dairy prod-  
uct here is admitted to be super-  
ior, as may be proven by the  
markets.

### CREAMERY SHARKS.

An Ohio subscriber asks us what  
a good creamery should cost and  
what is meant by "creamery  
sharks," says Hoard's Dairyman.  
A good creamery sufficient in  
capacity to manufacture the milk  
of 500 cows can be built for \$2,000  
all equipped. If the best quality  
of building and machinery is de-  
sired it will cost from \$500 to \$1,  
000 more.

The creamery shark is a man  
who induces a lot of farmers to  
subscribe stock, agreeing to take  
a certain amount himself, and  
when done the creamery costs from  
one thousand to two thousand dol-  
lars more than it is worth. A fa-  
vorite way is to get a few of the

leading farmers to act as stool pig-  
eons, by giving them some of the  
stock free. Every community of  
farmers about to engage in the  
creamery business ought, the first  
thing, to post themselves on the  
dairy question. The "shark"  
catches them because they are ig-  
norant of the business, and be-  
cause, like so many farmers in  
general, they think it don't pay to  
to read up and keep posted on this  
important question.

The money that has been squan-  
dered in "busted" creameries in  
these United States is enormous.  
Every day we see accounts of  
creameries that cost from \$4,000 to  
\$8,000 closed up or sold by the  
sheriff for as many hundred dol-  
lars. No creamery should be built  
to handle milk that cannot as a  
rule, muster 300 to 500 cows with-  
in an easy radius of three miles of  
the creamery. It takes cows to  
run a creamery, and it takes brains  
to run cows so as to make the milk  
production a profitable one.

The great bar to the farmers  
progress every where, is his un-  
willingness to enlighten himself as  
to the real meaning of this thing  
called "dairying." As a conse-  
quence the "creamery shark" catch-  
es him, the snide creamery man or  
operator catches him, the commis-  
sion merchant shark gets him to  
send a thousand or two dollars  
worth of butter to him and beats  
him out of the pay, and last but  
not least, poor cows, bad manage-  
ment on the farm, and other points  
of ignorance of the principles of  
good dairy practice catch him on  
every hand. Go to him and ask  
him to turn about, ask him to sub-  
scribe for a good dairy paper and  
buy Gurley's American Dairying,  
for instance, and he will tell you  
honestly and squarely that he  
"can't afford it." Yet he seems to  
think he can afford to lose money  
at every turn for the want of sound  
dairy knowledge.

There is no power on earth that  
can keep these men from being con-  
stantly bitten by outside "sharks"  
and their own inside folly, just as  
long as they think they "can't af-  
ford" to know the truth of things.  
They beat themselves and let  
the "sharks" beat them, when two  
cents a week and a little study  
would save them all that loss.

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schooner cannot cross after she  
gets inside. Well, in answer to  
that we will say that the steamer  
Harrison crosses this same shallow  
place every time she comes into  
this river and the only time she  
has any trouble is when she runs  
out of the channel onto the mud  
flats. That same shallow place is  
five miles from the mouth of the  
river, and the Himple & Wheeler  
mill is only 4 1/2 miles, therefore,  
schooners need not pass said shal-  
low place. The government char-  
shows that the lowest water from  
the mouth after crossing the bar,  
to the Himple & Wheeler mill is 8  
feet, thus, giving in June, when  
we have extreme low water, from  
14 feet to 17 feet of water at high  
tide, and from 16 feet to 19 feet  
most of the time.

A dispatch from Bandon, Ore.,  
states that the schooner Lizzie and  
Mattie is on the beach a quarter  
of a mile above the North jetty of  
the Coquille river and there is no  
hope of getting her off.

The Lillie and Mattie was re-  
cently chartered by Himple &  
Wheeler for the Nehalem river,  
but was influenced to throw up  
her charter no doubt by those who  
wish to hold a monopoly on this  
river. She sailed for Coquille with  
the above results. There are worse  
harbors on the coast than the Ne-  
halem.

### GARDEN TRUCK.

are full of wild fruits also, such as  
huckleberries, of which there are  
four varieties, salad berries, black-  
berries, thimble berries, salmon  
berries, and wild cranberries.

The business of raising vegeta-  
bles and small fruits here, is as-  
suming considerable proportions,  
and should be encouraged in every  
way possible.
