LOVE AND ROMANCE.

J. J. Stoddard and Ida Latimer Arrested on a Serious Charge but Promptly Acquitted.

For some time John Stoddard, manager of the late Advocate, and Miss Ida Latimer, daughter of J. W. Latimer, have been associating with each other. Mr. Latimer objected, and Stoddard was obliged to remain away from the Latimer parental domicile.

The girl who is about nineteen years of age, would not submit to the yoke of obedience, and straightway left home, seeking Stoddard. All persuasion to get her to return was without avail. She went to the rooms occupied by Fred Stoddard and wife, where John Stoddard's wife refused to remain under the circumstances, and that John and the girl occupied the place alone for several days and nights, and it was alleged that they occupied the same room.

Recently they were warned to get married within 48 hours or suffer prosecution. They neglected to comply with the request, and Tuesday Stoddard was arrested on the complaint of A. Harper, indicted by J. W. Latimer, on the charge of "lewd and illegal cohabitation." A charge of the same kind was filed against the girl. The trial of Stoddard was set for Wednesday at 10 o'clock.

The evidence of the prosecution was not positive. None of the witnesses could swear positively that the defendants occupied the same room at night, and Prosecuting Attorney Selph asked Judge Conder to dismiss the case, which was done.

The defense asked to make a statement however, and Stoddard was put on the stand. He claimed that he intended to marry the girl, and that he took her there because she was abused and driven from home, and that he was trying to get a place for her to work. He said that she slept in his room, but that he slept in an adjoining room on a chair. The girl was sworn and corroborated Stoddard's story. The charge against the girl was dismissed also.

County Court

Adjourned session held February 3rd. Bill of fees in case of State vs A. Johnson continued.

The county was divided into three districts, and one justice of the peace allowed for each district. The precincts in the first district are as follows: Nehalem and Foley. Second, Garibaldi, Barnegat, Bay, Hoquartion, Fairview, South Prairie, Netaris and Canadian. Third, Sand Lake, Blaine, Beaver, Hebo, Dolph, Union and Little Nestucca.

The sheriff's report on the delinquent tax list was received and approved.

The tax levy for 1896 was fixed as follows:

In other words the total levy is 26 mills or \$2 60 on each \$100 worth of property assessed. The district school tax for No. 9, is 12 mills, making 38 mills in all, or \$3 80 on \$100.

In addition to the regular \$1 00 poll tax a \$2 00 road poll tax was assessed to all who are liable for poll tax.
