TILLAMOOK COUNTY.

Great Wealth of Timber—The Dairying
Industry.

The following is taken from the New Year
Oregonian:

Tillamook bay is 40 miles South of the Colum-
bia and 500 miles north from San Francisco.
The County is about 30 miles long, lying on the
coast, and is 20 to 30 miles wide. There are four
bays—Nehalem, Tillamook, Netarts and Nes-
ucca—in the county. There are many fine riv-
ers, generally navigable several miles, and five
of them empty into Tillamook bay. These
streams have fine water power and are excellent
for floating logs. Many small creeks are good
for water power or floating logs. There are
several fine lakes on Nehalem beach. Springs
of pure water are found everywhere. Till-
amook bay is a good harbor; and the others will
be with proper improvement. Coasting schoon-
ers visit all of them.

The larger part of the county is hilly or
mountainous, and covered with valuable tim-
ber. There are some fine prairies in the valleys,
some open hill land, much excellent tideland
and a great deal of bottom land, the last require
clearing. There is coal in places, but the
timber is the greatest resource.

Here is the most valuable belt of timber in
the United States, cedar, fir, spruce and hem-
lock being the leading varieties. Some of these
trees are 10 or 12 feet through, and 200 to 300 feet
in height, straight as an arrow, free from
limbs, clear and sound. The average fir tree is
four to six feet in diameter, and no denser for-
ests are known to exist. There is enough tim-
ber here to back a hundred large sawmills saw-
ing a hundred years. There are several large
mills and several small ones in operation, but
this industry has barely commenced. The saw-
mills alone will cause a good city to grow up
here, and will support thousands of people.

There is much fine farming land, and farming
and stockraising pays, but dairying is the lead-
ing industry at present. The best butter and
cheese on the coast is made here, the climate,
water and feed being suited for it. There are
several large creameries, besides many small
dairies, and the county, though new, takes the
lead of the state in the dairying business. There
is grass here the year around. Hay can be
easily produced, and root crops are enor-
mous, so cattle can be kept with little expense.
Small fruits and vegetables of all kinds yield
abundantly. Apples, pears, prunes and plums
do well, and cherries thrive in some localities.
Bee-keeping is profitable, and the honey is of
exquisite flavor.

The fishing interests here are great, and the
salmon canneries give employment to many.
The output of salmon—canned, dried or salted
amounts to more than the wheat crop of some
of the interior counties.

Gold mining is carried on quite extensively
on the beach sands.

The scenery is magnificent beyond description,
and the Tillamook coast is becoming a
popular summer resort. The beaches, with
their picturesque arched rocks and wide
stretches of white sand, attract many visitors
each year, many of them camping out all sum-
mer. Clams, crabs, oysters, mussels, all kinds
of shell fish, clams, rock cod and other fish
are plentiful and easy to secure. Speckled
trout are abundant in the streams. Deer, elk,
bear, grouse, ducks, geese, snipe and other
are plentiful.

The climate is mild, cool in summer, warm
in winter, little or no snow, seldom any
ice, no droughts, no cyclones, thunder storms
rarely occur, and there is very little fog. Straw-
berry frequently ripen in December and Janu-
ary, and cattle range the hills all winter with-
out being fed. There is absolutely no malaria
or ague, seldom any fevers; diphtheria and
scarlet fever were never known here, and con-
sumptive or rheumatic, fare as well as any-
where. There is no stagnant water, and the
invigorating sea breeze keeps the atmosphere
purified.

The county is new, and has just begun to de-
velop, but is making rapid strides in the way
of improvement. Good roads are being built,
industries are being started, towns are growing
up, and a railroad is expected soon. The per-
centage of increase is greater than any other
county in the state, according to the state census
of 1890, there being now about 4000 people. This
will be doubled before another five years.
There is room for more industrious citi-
zens who have means. It is not a good place
for a poor man with a large family, unless he
has an iron nerve and a good constitution for
work. There is much government land yet sub-
ject to entry, but it is far back in the hills cov-
ered with brush or timber. Yet, there are con-
genious energetic people taking places there all
the time, clearing them up, and making homes.
Land is cheap yet.

Tillamook city, on an arm of Tillamook bay,
is the principal town and county seat. It has
schools, sawmills, banks, newspapers, creameries,
an academy, good schools, churches and lodges.
The streets are well improved, and the town
has electric lights. The population is about
1000, and it is building up fast. There is a daily
mail, daily stages to North Yambill, and in the
summer to Forest Grove, on the Southern Pa-
cific railroad. A boat makes weekly trips to
Astoria, and once every two weeks to San Fran-
cisco, both carrying freight and passengers.
There is a telegraph line from Tillamook to the
Willamette valley.

Nehalem, Woods, Bay City, Beaver, Dolph
and Garibaldi are ambitious places which an-
ticipate much in the future.

The United States government is spending a
few thousand dollars every year to improve
Tillamook harbor. Fifteen thousand dollars
was expended here this year, and we expect
\$25,000 next season, besides a few thousand dol-
lars to complete a road to the light house.

The best time to come here is in July, August
or September. The transportation facilities are
better and more regular during these months.

MAKING FANCY CHEESES.

It Pays Well After You Learn How to
Do It.

There is no part of dairying that pays
better than this work. At present most
of our fancy cheese is imported, although
nearly all of the famous varieties are
made on a small scale in this country.
The processes of making these fancy
kinds of cheese are supposed to be secret,
but they are open secrets and any one
can find out who wishes.

The celebrated Edam cheese, that sells
as high as \$1 apiece in this country, is
frequently manufactured right at home
and a foreign label attached. The same
is true of Roquefort, Brie and Parmesan
cheese, all of which have been so closely
imitated in this country that they equal,
and in some cases excel, the genuine.
Some of the less celebrated foreign fancy
kinds of cheese are being imitated in
various parts of the country, and the suc-
cess attending these efforts warrants
dairymen in engaging more extensively
in this work than they have done in the
past. The Neuchatel cheese imported
into this country is manufactured very
easily and at an expense that enables the
farmer to realize about 12 to 15 cents
per quart for his milk.

Foreign dairymen cannot enter into
competition with American dairymen in
the manufacture of the common cream
cheese, and they devote most of their
time to making fancy kinds. These al-
ways bring higher prices than the com-
mon grades, but the extra value is due
entirely to the labor and the methods of
curing and not to any extra quality or
quantity of milk. Labor is cheap with
them, and they have the patience to wait
for months and even years before selling
the products of their labor. In this re-
spect the average American differs from
the foreign dairymen. The former want
to see their profits at once and to keep
turning them over and over. The Euro-
pean farmer is willing to wait and give
his labor for some future payment.

Formerly it was generally supposed
that the imported cheeses could not be
made in this country because of the lack
of cool, dry caves in which most of them
are kept during the curing process. But
more recent experiments have shown
that any of the cheese bacteria can be
cultivated, and that artificial cellars and
curing rooms can be constructed for
their perfect development. The foreign
cheeses owe their peculiar flavor entirely
to the manner in which they are
made and to the temperature in which
they are placed to ripen. Both of these
conditions can be supplied in this coun-
try as well as in certain parts of Eu-
rope, and there is no reason why the
best imported cheese should not be made
here on a large scale.

The present conditions of our cheese
market would seem to warrant many
progressive dairymen entering more
largely into this work. American full
cream cheese has suffered in recent years
by the great quantities of inferior grades
made from part skim and full skim
milk. The consumptive demand has ac-
tually fallen off on account of these in-
ferior products. The farmer who wishes
to make a better cheese which will be
paid for according to the time and labor
expended in its manufacture cannot do
better than to attempt to make some
of the fancy varieties that are now exposed
for sale in the market.—C. S. Walters
in American Cultivator.
