LUMBERING.

[West Coast Lumberman.]

A good location for a big mill is wanted by a new firm known as Corbett & Fitzsimmons.

Weist Bros., of Oak Point, Wash. are putting in a new 35 horse power logging engine, and next summer expect to put in 12,000,000 feet of logs, employing 35 men.

Henry Ellis & Co., loggers of South Bend, are making preparations to remove the North river jam. A 50-horse power donkey engine has been ordered, and a scow is being built. The settlers above the jam offered a subsidy of logs to any one who would remove it.

Soft wood becomes stronger than hard wood under pressure. The case of a block of Oregon pine, taken from the middle of an upright which formed a part of the timber support in the Comstock mines for twelve years, gives an example of the effect of heavy pressure of wood fibers. It is so hard that it cannot be cut with a knife, and one of its sides is polished from the squeezing it has undergone. Yellow pine from the lower levels of the Comstock has been so compressed by the enormous

weight that its density exceeds that of lignum vitae.

Douglas fir seems to be destined to cut considerable of a figure in car construction work in the north-west. A west coast lumber trade paper recently looked into the matter and found that the great car builders of the country had commenced to use Washington lumber on a large scale, and that a number of the Pacific coast saw mills are making a specialty of looking after this trade. It is asserted that the car manufacturers could very profitably locate their plants on the Pacific coast, and thus be able to turn out cars there much cheaper than they now do in the east. The lumber for a box car costs \$50 on Puget Sound; laid down in Chicago it is worth \$125, which would give an advantage of \$75 in the item of lumber alone on every car turned out on Puget Sound. As fuel and labor can be found there equally as cheap, it is claimed that ten or twenty per cent would be saved in car building on the Sound. It may not be long before car builders will demonstrate the authenticity of these statements.

Mr. William E. Curtis contributes a chapter on Japanese carpentry to the Chicago News. According to his story the Japs cut all their lumber by hand at a time of year when they have nothing else to do, and each man who is engaged in business which requires lumber usually buys his own logs and cuts them up himself at odd times. Women and men both work at it, and in much the same style as prevailed before such a thing as a circular or band saw was ever thought of. All the lumber is dressed by hand. There is in Japan but one planing mill, that being in Yokohama, which employs about 150 hands, and its entire product after being made into boxes is shipped to India.
