Council Meeting.

At the council meeting Monday night, a bill allowing the marshal \$90 for two months' salary and \$5 for overseeing street work was allowed. The marshal was instructed to notify parties to put in cross walks where ordered at once to save costs. A committee was appointed to look after the drainage of certain low places in town.

An ordinance to prevent cruelty to animals, designed to protect horses from standing on the street in bad weather, for a long time without food, and from being abused in any way was read for the first time.

The following ordinance was read for the first time, passed to third reading, and adopted by unanimous consent:

ORDINANCE NO. —

AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE SALARY AND UNDERTAKING OF THE CITY RECORDER, TREASURER AND MARSHAL.

The People of Tillamook City do ordain as follows:

SEC. 1. The salary of the recorder of Tillamook city shall be ten dollars a month and before entering upon the discharge of his duties shall enter into an undertaking with Tillamook city in the sum of \$500 for the faithful performance of his duties.

SEC. 2. The salary of the city treasurer shall be twenty-five dollars a year. Before entering upon the discharge of his duties he shall enter into an undertaking with Tillamook city in the sum of \$1,000 for the faithful performance of his duties.

SEC. 3. The salary of marshal of Tillamook city shall be thirty dollars a month and before entering upon the discharge of his duties shall enter into an undertaking with Tillamook city in the sum of \$500 for the faithful performance of his duties.

SEC. 4. That all ordinances in conflict with these provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

COLD SNAP.

March Starts out Rather Chilly.

The most frigid weather known in these parts occurred here the 1st of March. The last day of February it snowed copiously but melted about as fast as it fell, however there were left about two or three inches of snow on the morning of March 1st, an east wind was blowing, there was quite a bit of ice, and the thermometer had dropped to 25 above zero, or 7 degrees below the freezing point. This lasted but a short time however, and it went back to 32 degrees above.

This is the coldest spell here for several years, though about seven years ago the mercury registered at 15 above, and old settlers inform us that many years ago the temperature was down to 5 degrees above zero.

At no time this winter prior to March 1st, however, has the mercury marked below 32, the freezing point, and grass was growing nicely in January and February. This cold snap is a temporary setback to the grass and some budding trees, but will do no great damage.

People here shivered and complained as much as they would in the East, where the thermometer often shows 40 to 60 degrees colder.

This unusual demonstration in March, perhaps, indicates that we shall have a beautiful and early spring, in fact it has already begun.

A NARROW ESCAPE

The Capizing of the Bay City parties Last Week.

"A storm on sea is a terrible thing. But a storm on land frights the stoutest souls."

The full force and meaning of these lines was never more forcibly demonstrated than it was in our town recently. About 8 o'clock in the morning of Feb. 26th, Messrs. Wm. Woods and William Hendricks of this place started to cross the bay in a sail boat.

Many persons expressed surprise at their venture, when there was every indication of a strong southerly gale.

Anxious eyes watched their progress until they reached the Sturgeon channel just off "Flower pot" where they suddenly disappeared from sight, and by the use of marine glasses we could discover in that locality what appeared to be two persons clinging to a capized boat, and this it proved to be, for their boat was tossed bottom up by a sudden twist of the wind and the unlucky mariners could be seen with heads just above the surface of the turbulent waters heroically battling with the elements with apparently little hope of success.

So great was their distance from help and so perilous was the trip to them in a small boat in such a storm. Nevertheless a boat was soon manned by four courageous men viz: R. W. Robbins, Gilbert Eyke, Frank Oakes and Alfred Magnusen. It seemed a hopeless and perilous task, but considering only the question of duty they were willing to make the effort if there was only as great a probability of saving these men's lives as there was of losing their own.

Their heroic effort was watched with abated breath and prayerful solicitude by the friends on shore.

The wind and tide was rapidly carrying these hapless victims out toward the sea. The rescuing party laid to their oars manfully but their progress was exasperatingly slow, and it seemed that the unfortunate men could not hold on until relief came. Just at this time which was 9:30 A. M. the little gasoline boat "Irene" reached our dock. She was quickly unloaded of her freight and passengers excepting Messrs. Tuttle, Trowbridge and Colton of Tillamook, and Mr. H. F. Kirby of Bay City, and she immediately put out to the rescue. It seemed at times she could not ride the seas and must meet the same fate of those whom she sought to rescue, but she demonstrated her seaworthiness in a manner that leaves no doubt in the minds of those who witnessed her performance.

In just 30 minutes she reached the wreck and safely landed the two drowning men onto her decks, and a shout of joy went up from a hundred or more thankful hearts. The four men who manned the first boat were within ten rods of the wreck when the victims were pulled out of the water. They were brought ashore in an exhausted condition and were soon restored by the usual care and restoratives.

Too much praise cannot be given. The brave and noble act of Lawrence Johnson, the "Irene" master, for his courage and skill in handling his boat in such a sea, nor to those who risked their lives with him, and also to those who formed the first rescuing party, and our citizens unanimously vote these brave men their deepest and undying gratitude.
