There has been some talk of forming an A. P. A. order at Sand Lake. There is certainly an abundance of good material in this vicinity out of which we think an organization could be gotten up.

Nehalem's New Road.

S. Scovel writes as follows: At the road meeting a permanent organization was effected with the following officers: President P. D. Newell, Secretary S. Scovel, Treasurer A. Himple, for Woodmen S. M. Patterson and Cole Wheeler, for viewers Pat Smith, E. B. Ziler and Wm. Shollmyer.

The viewers were instructed to locate the road on the best route from north Necarney to the beach north of Arch Cape. There has been raised by subscription in cash \$122 and 85 days work so far in Nehalem to be expended on this road. All to be expended before June 25th. If the enterprise receives the support that it should the work will be pushed forward and a road opened ready for trade this summer.

Regarding the School.

Tillamook, Ogn. Mch. 10, 1896. ED HEADLIGHT:—Inasmuch as the report of the Committee to the school meeting is a virtual condemnation of the management of the school by the board of directors as heretofore constituted, it is perhaps not improper to say that from one cause and another numerous abuses had crept into the school; the boys had become ungentelemanly, and in some cases, at least, the girls were not conducting themselves as ladies should, and it seemed to the directors that a radical change must be inaugurated. A series of men had occupied the position as principal and had failed to bring the school like what the directors conceived it should be. They did not desire to maintain a Reform School. What was wanted, was to have the scholars placed upon an entirely different basis; that the young men should conduct themselves decently through the natural instincts of gentlemen, and the directors considered that there was no better way to appeal to the innate chivalry and manhood of the boys than that they should be presided over by an intelligent, gentle, firm lady.

The directors understood, perhaps as well as the committee, that they had the power to employ a man whose severity would beat into submission the scholars of the school. But they did not think, for a minute that any parent in the district would desire to have their children thrashed into submission. And I do not think so yet. I do not believe that one of the men who signed that report will willingly say in public that he would prefer to have his own children cudgeled into good behavior rather than have them come home with a frank, smiling face, proud in the consciousness of uncompelled rectitude.

The gentlemen of the committee may insist that they did not mean to advocate the introduction of a club; but the report must be taken to mean something. It admits that the present principal is capable, and is conducting a good school which, of course implies discipline. We have a school according to the report, well conducted by efficient and capable teachers, in which flogging is not practiced. The only change that the report suggests, impliedly, but unavoidably, is a good school, efficiently maintained, with flogging practiced.

The lack of logic in the report, considering the gentlemen who prepared it, is something astounding. In a report, occupying, say, a page of legal cap the principal is commended as an efficient and competent teacher, and her removal could go no further. Another questionable phase is presented in the demand for the reduction of salaries. It will be interesting to see any board of directors maintain the high standard of the school as at present conducted in all its departments with a corps of teachers at one single dollar less than has been paid.

In conclusion, I do not think, if the gentlemen who signed this report had been possessed of any knowledge of that school, of its former condition compared with its present; if they had examined the papers of the children at the regular examination, and seen the wonderful improvement brought about in that school under the management of the present principal, in less than one year, that they would have ever signed so unjust and ill considered a document.

Trivial Prosecutions.

The town has been kept in a furor of excitement and bitterness lately by a number of arrests.

Some boys were out on a little lark the night of the snow, and engaged in a little innocent laughter, when their to-boggan upset, and they were arrested. The whole performance was entirely devoid of harm and could not possibly have annoyed or injured anyone, but from some peculiar desire to be finicky and carry favor the boys were arrested. According to the reports in the dailies there were frolicsome performances that day and night in every city from the Sound to San Francisco, and some damage was done by throwing snowballs in places, but there is no record of an arrest anywhere else, and no such thing was ever heard of before.

One boy who came to the crowd was slightly intoxicated and gave two or three "whoopies," but that boy went and paid his fine. One other was after trial fined \$5, though the business men here promptly paid his fine. Some of the boys were dismissed, and some are to be tried on the 23rd.

It is probable at that time the authority of the marshal will be tested, as the charter requires the marshal to be a real estate owner in the city, and according to the county records he does not now own and never did own any property in the county, and the books show he has not even paid poll tax since he has resided here.

The tax payers of this town want law and order, and will surely uphold the actions of the peace officers, even though they be slightly in the wrong, however if heed is given to some agitators here the town will be in a turmoil all the time, and no good accomplished.
