The tree had burned off and the boy failed to get out of the way in time. His body was crushed into a shapeless mass, being buried into the ground beneath the heavy tree, and it took quite a time to get the body out.

The same boy was accidentally wounded by a gun two or three years ago.

I hereby announce myself as a candidate for Joint Representative.

In the loft overhead were ten bushels of black walnuts, a bin of hickory nuts, and six gallons of hazelnuts in an old pillow slip, hanging from the roof by a string, to keep the mice out.

Amidst these auspicious and inspiring surroundings was I ushered into Posey county nearly 33 years ago, and I have felt a yearning ever since to climb to the highest niche in the temple of fame or get as rich as John Jacob Astor.

While in my early youth my parents moved to Pike county, Missouri, with me, and in an old log school house was laid the foundation of my education. My dear uncle wanted me to be a preacher, and loaded me down with theological books, finally assisting me to go to a United Brethren school, where I began to prepare for the ministry. A large Wm. Goat was placed in a closet one night where the professors kept some apparatus, and next morning at general exercises the goat got out and made a "rampe" of several long-faced theologians. practiced a while. One man whom I prescribed for is still living. Death came to the relief of my other patients. I al,

so taught school, and deviled in a country printing office. When I was 21 years old was elected Police Magistrate on the prohibition ticket in an Illinois town. Since that time I have tried many professions. I dealt faro in a town in Arizona for about two weeks, but a fellow came along who looked like a minister of the gospel and he "busted" the bank. I have washed dishes in a hotel, slashed several acres of brush, cooked for a crew, was a book agent, belonged to the Salvation Army, tramped, was a capitalist, drove oxen, farmed, and have run a country newspaper.

As to my reputation, for honesty I will say that I am widely known for my truth and veracity, and have never been caught stealing, though water-melons roasted high where I was raised. My virtue has never been questioned.

I am of good moral character, of broad views, and believe in a literal hell for politicians. I have been in love hundreds of times, married a few times, and have four healthy children who may well be proud of their good old Hoosier stock. I have had the measles, been vaccinated, am now in sound health, and intend to take Keeley's jag cure, if elected, which is now located at Salem for the benefit of the legislature.

I am sound financially. Like many other prominent men here, for the safety of my creditors, my property is about all in my wife's name—in fact it was transferred to her some time ago with the condition that she should support me, which she has done quite well. I made a good bargain, which shows business sagacity on my part. I shall not squander my money on this campaign until I find out I am elected, and not then until I ascertain what I make out of the office.

You ask what I'll do when I get to the legislature. Well, I am for Joe Simon, for Senator unless somebody has a larger sack. I'll secure a clerkship for as many of you as possible, though I should prefer one of those dapper lady clerks that usually hang around the legislature. I will try to get home with more money than I start out with. I walked into Tillamook seven years ago, dead broke, and gentlemen of this county, I hope you will send me out in good style, with money in my pockets, and be prepared to banquet me on my return.

If these qualifications and pledges are worth anything, give me your votes. If you think not, it simply shows your lack of judgment.
