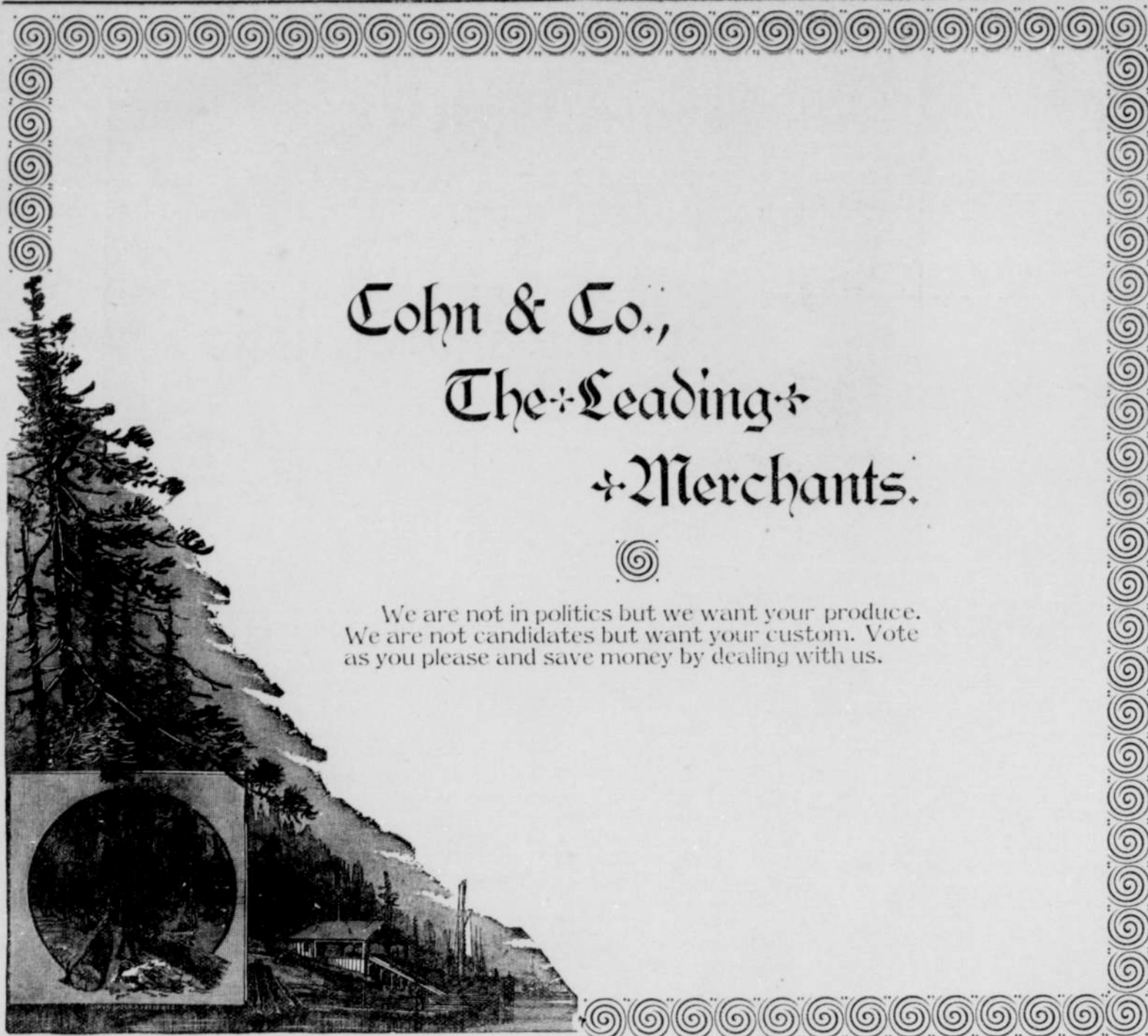

The HEADLIGHT subscription list is increasing faster than ever, though we stopped a few numbers last week. We have about a dozen subscribers which we will give to our campaign cotemporary—that is we did have them, but have stopped them. Their names have been given to the business men here.
In most counties in this state the representation for delegates is one to thirty, fifty or one-hundred voters. Here it is one to every ten voters, and as a result the conventions are very large, besides, owing to recent falling off in the ranks of the democratic party, they actually have had a hard time getting enough democrats for delegates in many precincts.
E. G. E. Wist has the foundation for his new cannery about completed on the site where his store formerly stood in this city. The main building will be 44x72 feet, and will be covered with corrugated iron, about 30 tons of which Mr. Wist has already ordered and expects on the next steamer from San Francisco. The boiler, retort, and other appliances are awaiting shipment in Portland.—T.
It is said that at a meeting of the populists and democrats last week it was decided for the two parties to fuse, or reciprocate partially at least. The understanding was that John Edwards, democrat, for clerk, and J. W. Hawkins, populist, for sheriff should have the votes of both parties. As to the other candidates it was thought best to make regular tickets as there is no chance to elect a populist, except for sheriff or clerk. These are the most remunerative offices and it seems this is why there is such a fight for them, always causing splits in the various parties. The populists and democrats count on a split in the republican ranks to enable them to run their men in.

The Vancouver Creamery, which is the largest and best equipped creamery in the Northwest, reports that it used over five million pounds of milk last year. An experienced creameryman told the editor of the HEADLIGHT recently, however, that the Vancouver creamery is much given to exaggeration, and that he visited the creamery at Vancouver when the company claimed it was getting over 20,000 pounds of milk per day, but in reality the amount received was only five or six thousand pounds per day. One creamery in Tillamook, that of the Tillamook Dairy Association of Fairview, uses over four million pounds of milk per year, the receipts running from 8000 to 16000 pounds per day, and this is rather underestimated. The two other creameries here use as much milk as the Fairview establishment.
There should be a large public hall here, on the ground floor. It should be fitted up in good shape for theatrical purposes, and could be used for dances when desired. You say it will not pay! Well, if some man will put up the building and make it two stories high, with rooms to rent above, we believe there are persons here who will lease the upper story for offices or other purpose, and perhaps some responsible parties here will sign an agreement guaranteeing a certain amount of rent per year in order to induce somebody to make the investment. It would be hard to get donations enough to build the hall, though some might encourage the enterprise in that way, however it is probable the guarantee could be obtained readily. The present halls used for dancing and theatrical shows are most ridiculously inconvenient, unsuitable, and are dangerous firetraps, mostly in the third story. This matter should not rest, but the building should be put up as soon as good weather comes.

A Letter from Hermann.
House of Representatives,
Washington, D. C., March 18, '96.
Dear Mr. Jones:—
The river and harbor committee today voted to place in the river and harbor bill and to appropriate \$6,000 for government work on the Nestucca bay; also \$16,000 for continuing the work on Tillamook, and this sum I hope to have increased in the senate to \$35,000.
We have also provided for a survey for a reduced project for jetty work at Nehalem, and still hold our \$10,000, as the project recommended is so large and the estimated cost so great that \$10,000 is too small a sum to commence work with. My plan is to secure a less costly project and then by adding \$20,00 to that on hand we can commence active jetty work on the Nehalem, which has suffered the opposition of the engineers, and they have so far recommended against expending the money which I secured some years ago.
For mouth of Tillamook bay I have now provided in the River and Harbor bill for a survey for jetty work.
You will thus see that I am doing all I can for Tillamook county. The \$16,000 now secured in the committee is as much as the House and Senate gave in last bill. I only got \$12,000 before and the senate added \$4,000. Now I secure \$16,000 in my committee, so that we can hope the senate will amend by a liberal addition.
In the short session I hope to get my life saving bill through for Tillamook bay if I can get facts and figures as to loss of lives and property along the coast near the mouth of the bay.
You may say to the people of Tillamook county that I avail myself of every opportunity to advance the waterway interests of that county.

New Saw Mill.
Messrs. Davis & Co., representing the Pacific Lumber Co., are here making preparations to start a new saw mill. They have purchased two acres of ground on the South Trask, of Capt. Stillwell, and the site chosen will be convenient to deep water, and to the road to Tillamook—the road running west to connect to the light house road.
The capacity of the mill will be 20,000 feet per day, and the machinery is expected here the first of next week.
It is proposed to ship the lumber manufactured to San Francisco, and to supply whatever demand is made upon them for the home market.
