the nomination for Treasurer, and
everybody is satisfied with the choice.
Mr. Barker has held the office for the
past two years to the satisfaction of the
people, and will do the same for the
coming two years. John Barker is hon-
est, responsible, and will have no trou-
ble in giving good bonds to make the
county safe.

J. S. Stephens, of Tillamook, who re-
ceived the nomination for Assessor, is
well qualified for the position, besides
he has but one arm, and should be fa-
vored on that account since he is per-
fectly competent to fill the office. Mr.
Stephens has had considerable experi-
ence assessing.

A. M. Austin, of Netarts, who was re-
nominated for Surveyor, has filled the
office satisfactory to the people, and is a
deserving young man. Of course he
will be elected by a large majority.

G. W. Kiger, of Bay City, was nomi-
nated for School Superintendent. This
is a very important office, though little
pay in it. The people may rest assured
that Mr. Kiger is perfectly competent
for the place.

C. E. Reynolds, of this place, again
has the nomination for Coroner, and
there is no reason why he will not be
elected by as large a vote as last year—
perhaps much larger.

W. Findley for J. P. and H. Scholl-
meyer for Constable, were selected in
Justice precinct No. 1. They are both
all right.

G. W. Sappington, now of Netarts,
was nominated for J. P., and S. V. An-
derson for Constable in Precinct No. 2.
They are both good men. Mr. Sapping-
ton will move to town when elected.

In precinct No. 3, Jasper Smith was
chosen for J. P. and A. D. Sanders for
Constable. They are satisfactory to the
people in that end of the county.

Sometime before election this paper
will give a more extended notice regard-
ing the qualifications of the several can-
didates.

THE DEFEATED ONES.

Schooner Run Down.

San Francisco, Feb. 26.—The schooner
Helen Merriam was run down and
completely wrecked by the schooner
Christina Steffens last Sunday morning,
about 22 miles off Point Reyes. Cap-
tain Gruggel and the three men who
composed the crew of the Merriam, were
taken off by the Steffens. The Merriam
drifted along the ocean and is now per-
haps at the bottom. Capt. Gruggel lays
all the blame of the accident on the
Steffens. The latter, he says, had no
lights out, and could not be discerned
until she was on top of his vessel. To
make matters worse, according to his
story, the master of the Steffens refused
to stand by and assist in saving his
vessel.

Both schooners were bound north,
the Merriam to Nehalem river, and the
other to Timber cave, which is about 30
miles north of the point where the ac-
cident occurred.
